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## New Light on

## Dr. John Owen

In the first volume of The Works of John Owen (ed. W. H. Goold, 1850) nine letters written by John Owen are to be found.<sup>1</sup> The words printed immediately before seven of the letters read: "the following letters embrace all the Correspondence of Dr. Owen which has been preserved and is of any importance". This was a rather careless statement for the editor to make since in the first volume of The Works of John Owen (ed. T. Russell, 1826) far more than nine letters are either printed or referred to in the text or footnotes.

Interest in the life, work and thought of John Owen has been reawakened in the last four years through at least two factors. First, the Goold edition has been reprinted, partly in England and partly in the U.S.A.<sup>2</sup> Secondly, Dr. Geoffrey F. Nuttall discovered a manuscript containing a transcript of fifteen letters of Owen in the library of New College, London.<sup>8</sup> It seemed, therefore, to the present writer that, as a preliminary investigation before he attempted to write a biography of Owen,<sup>4</sup> he should make a thorough search for all the extant correspondence of this great Puritan. What follows is the result of his search.5

This correspondence reveals the wide interests and influence that John Owen exerted from 1650 until his death in 1683. His concern for the extension of the kingdom of God is also revealed in two pamphlets which are neither printed nor listed in any edition of his works. First, he was the person chiefly responsible for the Humble Proposals for the Propagation of the Gospel submitted to Parliament in 1652. Secondly, he wrote a short manual for ordinary church members entitled A Guide to Church Fellowship and Order, which was published posthumously in 1692. Further, he wrote many prefaces for the books of other men. Since Goold's list of these is incomplete what is hoped is a complete list is given below.

Owen denied that he wrote this in his 'epistle' in Caryl's Nature ... of Love (1673) after Dr. John Echard had launched an attack upon him for writing it. 2. In The Life and Death of Mr. Henry Jessey (1671) there is a poem attributed to 'J.O.' but this is not Dr. John Owen. 3. Banners of Grace and Love (1657) seems to be a revised edition of Whitfield's, Strengthe out of Weaknesse (1652).
