His contributions to Norfolk Archaeology and the Norfolk Record Society are listed. "Here as elsewhere his deep interest in Nonconformist, especially Baptist, history and his love of the Norwich region and its intellectual and cultural inheritance were central to his writings. long preoccupations flowered most notably in The Jacobin City, a portrait of Norwich 1788-1802, published in 1975, which broke new ground as a study, based securely on original sources, of Norwich at a time of intellectual and social ferment".
