B. Bandyopadhyaya's presentation of Christ.

In its own way, Prof. D. A. Thangasamy's review of Dr. Chandran's *Christian Ethics* also raises basic and pertinent questions concerning the relation between Christian and Hindu

thinkers and systems in India.

Can we take this opportunity of reminding our readers that letters to the Editor, provided they are concise and to the point, are very welcome? It is surprising that the variety of views expressed in this *Journal* can often pass without comments from our readers. A few letters, published from time to time, would certainly help the *Journal* to become a more lively forum of theological thinking in India.
