We congratulate two members of the Baptist Historical Society whose work on nonconformist history has led to academic success. Miss Bessie Sellwood has been awarded the M.A. degree of the University of Birmingham for her thesis on "Dissenting meeting houses in England before 1740", and David Bebbington has gained a University of Cambridge Ph.D. degree for his thesis on "The nonconformist conscience: a study in the political attitudes and activities of evangelical nonconformists 1886-1902". Dr. Bebbington has also contributed a most interesting paper on "Gladstone and the nonconformists: a study in religious affinity" to the latest volume of *Studies in Church History* (vol. 12, Oxford, 1975). More recently he has been unravelling the tangled story of the admission of nonconformists to the universities.
