



Principal Jeffreys back in York


Revival Fire brighter than ever.



Power from on High

VI.—Spiritual Gifts and Natural Ability

'N every public ministry there is the danger of the believer being ensnared by the praise of men. Speaking of those who did their alms before men to be seen of them Jesus said, "They have their reward." They wanted the praises of men and they got them and they were satisfied with the bargain, even though it cost them a handful of silver. Publicity and praise please most people, even the spiritual. Perhaps the tasks we do would only be half as delightful if our work was "unhonoured and unsung." praises of men are as inevitably the result of public ministry as the criticisms of men. The people of Lycaonia brought garlands to put upon Paul and Barnabas and said they were gods come down in the likeness of men, and then not long after they stoned Paul. Public opinion is exceedingly and dangerously fickle, nevertheless many people are lured by the limelight. God gave the apostles favour with the people. Such favour is necessary to the success of the ministry but it is certainly not necessary to the growth of a soul in grace. The fruit of the Spirit of Christ produces the Church's beauty of form and character. The gifts of the Holy Ghost are like jewels that adorn the Church and add attractiveness. Each gift sparkles with supernatural power: but the sparkle of these jewels is intended to draw attention to the giver and not so much to the wearer. He who manifests a spiritual gift cannot avoid occupying a position of prominence but should avoid using spiritual gifts as a means of getting prominence. Without a doubt many unimpressive and impure

VOCAL MANIFESTATIONS

are prompted by a subtle desire to be seen and heard of men even as the alms-giving of some Pharisees were. This desire is given scope often through ignorance concerning the manner in which these vocal gifts operate and not often does this desire override definite knowledge. Though there may be a desire for prominence in the mind sometimes there is also a sincere belief that the manifestation given is pure and perfect. Even where there is not this desire to be seen and heard of men, but instead a pure desire to glorify God, yet through ignorance concerning the functioning of vocal gifts, impure gifts can be manifest.

Though a believer at some time did receive one of these vocal gifts yet at the present time that believer may be obstructing the power of God. Disobedience and lack of faith and many other things make the soul and body less susceptible to the influence of the Spirit of God and thus that gift may not have functioned for a long time. Not because that gift is withdrawn from the believer, but because the channel from the human spirit to the tongue, which the Holy Ghost made for Himself in giving the gift, has become obstructed. Those parts of the soul and body which must come under the influence of the Holy Ghost when a vocal gift operates, through a number of causes, cease to be pliable enough to yield to the influence of the power of God within. A believer in this state may try to assist

an imperfectly functioning gift of tongues with the aid of the foreign

FORCE OF EMOTION

or might endeavour to continue using by natural ability

a gift of prophecy or interpretation.

In considering imitations we might include a satanic counterfeit but such a discussion would lead us outside of the scope of these articles. No believer can become the tool of the Devil while indwelt by the Spirit of Christ which makes us one of His.

Because vocal gifts are spiritual gifts they are a superior type of utterance to natural speech. exalted speech lasts only for that short period when the believer is the channel for the power outflowing in this manner. As it is dependent entirely upon that short and definite period of inspiration it is clearly distinguished from the natural talent. The supernatural is evident immediately when the gift of tongues is in operation but it is hidden deeper in all the other vocal gifts. The miracle is exceedingly plain when a person speaks in a language he has never learned but it is not so apparent when the exalted speech is in the language known to the believer. The characteristics of vocal gifts that are mentioned in these pages will help the believer to understand his manifestations. There is a slight possibility of being mistaken about speaking in tongues even apart from the satanic counterfeit. A highly emotional condition in some people during seasons of prayer can produce an indistinct jumble of sounds, but no one need mistake this for speaking in tongues. Those who have the gift of tongues ought to exercise it constantly in private devotion until, with the aid of

GROWTH IN GRACE,

it becomes fluent and more than a repetition of a few words. Some people can naturally wax eloquent when they feel deeply about a certain thing; this type of utterance might be mistaken by some people for prophecy or interpretation if it occurred under appropriate circumstances in a meeting. It would be glorifying to God if all who believed they had either of these two gifts examined their manifestations by all the scriptural detail they know in order to avoid being mistaken in this manner.

In a vocal manifestation that is in the language known by all the listeners the thought can be appreciated. The thought of inspired speech is always fresh and powerful. Self-consciousness or nervousness may cause an utterance to falter and stumble and thus it would not have that unrestricted and smooth flow that are characteristics of outflowing rivers of living water.

The Holy Ghost can dominate the vocal organs sufficiently to eliminate these impurities. The naturalness of any interpretation or prophecy is evidence that it is not functioning properly, for let us bear in mind that these utterances are called "spiritual gifts" and not natural talents. If we are able to speak naturally the same matter, and in the same manner that we

speak supernaturally where then is the purpose of spiritual gifts? How far removed from that natural type of utterance will be those words that are the outgushings of rivers of

THE SPIRIT'S ENERGY.

Some people may doubt the advisability of suppressing gifts that are not functioning perfectly through the believer, seeing that so much of the manifestation is of the power of the Holy Ghost. If any utterance is interfered with by the natural in any way through the interpolation of human thought or word or emotion or self-consciousness or nervousness that utterance because it restricts the freedom of the Holy Ghost in His work of dominating the vocal organs can be called impure. The very fact that these human interferences have occurred in the utterances is evidence that insufficient power has been loosened from its source to dominate perfectly the organs for the exercising of the vocal gift. In I. Corinthians xiv. 7, 8 the apostle teaches that uncertain sounding manifestations are unprofitable, for he says, "And even things without life giving sound, whether pipe or harp, except they give a distinction in the sounds, how shall it be known what is piped or harped? For if the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself to the battle?" Surely an imperfectly functioning manifestation is an uncertain sounding trumpet. Paul would even forbid the use of purely functioning gifts if there was not love in that same believer, so it is difficult to imagine him allowing impure vocal manifestations. In I. Corinthians xiv. 29 Paul asks the prophets to judge the utterance of the other prophets. He is not asking them to judge the

ORDER OF THE UTTERANCE

for he is speaking of a prophecy in order. He first says, "Let the prophets speak two or three," then after putting the prophecy in its correct order he says "and let the other judge." If he is not asking them to judge the utterance for its order he must be asking them to judge it for its purity. If he is not intending to eliminate the impurely functioning prophecies why judge them at all? It would be both confusing and futile for those judging merely to pass a verdict on each prophecy and then if impure allow them to continue.

In Romans xii. 6 we read, "Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us, whether prophecy, let us prophesy according to the proportion of faith." Some people may see in this passage of scripture something in favour of impure gifts in meetings. First let us notice that we are to prophesy, and impurely functioning prophecy is not literally prophecy. Secondly, if we confine our prophecy to that which is only of faith we will only have pure utterance, for any impurities are not of faith. Thirdly, we are to exercise prophecy according to the faith we have, not the faith we have not, for an impurely functioning prophecy is due to lack of faith. This passage of scripture can only mean that we must have sufficient faith to exercise a gift properly and when we have that proportion let us exercise that gift. It is not

THE SETTING OF THE STONE

that makes it a pure gem, neither is speech "interpretation" just because it follows an utterance in

"tongues." To give words that occupy this position the name "interpretation" just because they happen to be spoken after an utterance in "tongues" is just the same as calling a coloured piece of glass a gem because it is set in a ring. The least we can say concerning a vocal gift is that it is supernatural. Every sincere believer will want to see the evidences of its super-naturalness and God will be honoured when they find those evidences. Should we through ignorance or vanity exalt natural speech or impurely functioning gifts to the importance of "manifestations of the Spirit "how confusing and disappointing will such vocal manifestations be to the sincere believer. Such scriptural definitions as I. Corinthians xii. 4-11, "Now there are diversities of gifts, but the same Lord . . . but it is the same God which worketh all in all. But all these worketh that one and the selfsame Spirit . . . " compel the earnest seeker after God to "Covet earnestly the best gifts." Such remarkable manifestations of the power of the Holy Ghost are valuable and worth possessing. Imagine the effect of ordinary and unconvincing natural imitations and impurely functioning manifestations on many seekers who are inspired by the scriptural definition. However naturally eloquent is the speech and refined the voice the natural talent cannot exhibit the super-naturalness of the spiritual gift.

The imparting of a spiritual gift is a definite act. It is imparted when

THE HOLY GHOST SUBDUES

to Himself those particular factors or members of the believer's being that are needed by Him to manifest His power in any particular way. In the gift of discernment of spirits the Holy Ghost subdues certain psychic factors of the believer's being, thus creating intense spiritual perception. In the case of vocal gifts the Holy Ghost subdues the vocal organs thus producing eloquent and powerful speech. When any particular factors or members of the believer's being have once been subdued, immediately there is an uprising of power within that believer, those parts of the believer are the first to yield to the pressure of that power. Just as water finds an outlet through the weakest part of a dam so the living waters find an outlet through those parts of the believer's being that are the most easily subdued and the quickest to yield. When once the Spirit has subdued certain parts of the believer (this happens the first time any gift operates through that believer) those parts of the believer's being are under a special control of the indwelling Holy Ghost and thus that believer has a particular spiritual gift. Impure gifts are an attempt by a gifted believer to work with human energy those organs or factors of his being, that the Holy Ghost once subdued to Himself, on an occasion when there is not sufficient power of the Holy Ghost loosened within him to do so. From the belly of the believer the Holy Ghost makes a channel for outlet and if a believer had three spiritual gifts there would be three different passages for the

OUTFLOW OF POWER.

If the power of God were working mightily in that believer all the three channels could be flooded at the same time and thus the three gifts of working of miracles, faith and healings could operate together.

O praise the Lord, He first loved me, I have new life upspringing. Hallelujah! There is an eternal source of strength, and every born-again man and woman has tapped it. As sinners we were without strength, but, bless His name, even then Christ died for the ungodly. were without God, without strength, but now through wondrous grace we have God our strength. 'N no country in the world are there so many changes taking place as in Palestine. People who visited the country in pre-war days, and visit it again to-day are astonished at the remarkable transformation that has been achieved. From Dan to Beersheba the progressive work of Great Britain is in evidence. For something like 400 years the Holy Land had lain under the baneful influence of the Turk, bleak, barren and unprogressive. With the defeat of Turkey and the assumption by Britain of the mandate a new era began for the Holy Land. Prosperity returned to her borders, fertility to the land through agricultural development, exports and imports began to increase and trade and commerce with the outside world revived.

In nothing are the changes taking place so manifest as in the methods of travel. A few years ago the horse was the fastest known manner of transportation, and the donkey and the camel were the most commonly used modes of travel. To-day all this has changed. The modern traveller has his private motor car or the more plebian motor 'bus to whirl him around from place to place. Even the Arab dislikes the slow travel methods of his forefathers and crowds the motor 'buses to capacity in travelling up and down the length of Palestine. The Palestine State Railways provide a daily service between

PALESTINE AND EGYPT

and towns and cities in the Holy Land, and if other, faster means of travel, is desired, the Imperial Airways will take the tourist from Jerusalem to Cairo in two hours and a half. The same type of plane is used as those on the London-Paris air service, and every luxury and comfort is assured the traveller crossing the desert by air. Leaving the Palestine aerodrome at 11.30 your lunch will be served in the air and you will arrive at Cairo in nice time for afternoon tea. So has air travel annihilated space in the East.

It is indeed a strange medley and contrast of the old and the new that is to be seen in the Holy Land to-day. Both struggle side by side, the picturesque old reluctant to give place to the utilitarian new. Perhaps there are some who will be disposed to question the value of some of the innovations that have been introduced, and to question the supposed progress that has been made. And yet surely no one will deny that it is better to travel over good roads than bad ones, to have up-to-date hotels than execrable inns, and to have an adequate water supply of filtered water that runs from taps than to have to draw it from malarial wells. There is something to be said for progress of this kind, and there is abundance of it to be seen in Palestine.

The three principal cities of Palestine are Jerusalem, Jaffa with Tel Aviv, and Haifa. The last census of Palestine which was taken in 1932 shows a remarkable growth of these cities, particularly the last two,

and Its Cities To-day

due of course, to the tide of Jewish immigration that is flowing strongly towards the land of their fathers. Jaffa including Tel Aviv and Haifa represent the industrial life of Palestine. Jerusalem is the cultural and religious centre, but it is the coastal cities that are building up the prosperity of the country and in which the rapid strides and development going on are most manifest.

In the matter of scenic beauty and location Haifa is the most favoured. Like Jerusalem it is beautiful for situation, clustering around the base of Mount Carmel, and to-day spreading far up the mountain side. See it in the early morning from the deck of a ship when the haze lies low along the shore and the sun gleams brightly on the red roofs of the houses on the slopes of the hillside, and it makes a lovely picture. Haifa is the meeting-place of international trade. For years the British Government has been at work on the new harbour, spending over £1,000,000 on the work. Haifa will no doubt yet be-

come one of the great ports of the East. As most people know, it is the terminal of the great pipe-line which is to run from Mosul carrying the oil across the Syrian desert through Transjordan and the plain of Esdraelon. This vast enterprise is helping to make trade boom in Haifa, and is one of the most ambitious projects of its kind in the world. It is these and other factors that are making Haifa the chief industrial centre of Palestine, and imparting to it an international aspect.

It would have been expected that with the increasing importance of Haifa, Jaffa would have been eclipsed. It is not so. While much of the international trade will no doubt be diverted from Jaffa with the completion of the new harbour at Haifa, the former town has shown perhaps the most amazing growth of any place in the Holy Land. This has been due, of course, to the development of the comparatively new suburb known as Tel Aviv. This is probably the only one hundred per cent Jewish town in the world. It is a separate municipality, but is in reality

a suburb of Jaffa. It is impossible for the visitor to tell when he has left the one town and has entered the other. It is on the shore of Jaffa or Tel Aviv that the tides of Jewish immigration break, and in the past few years it has increased tremendously. The twin cities have to-day a population of more than one hundred thousand persons. Even more than Jerusalem and Haifa it is the centre of Jewish life.

It is here that Jews with capital to invest invariably come, and settle in Tel Aviv. A very modern city, it gives the visitor the impression that it has come up in a night like the gourd of Jonah. In reality it has been on the way since before the commencement of the war. But its greatest strides and development have taken place since 1918. It is a city of white concrete and brick, of handsome homes and apartment houses and hotels. Along its sandy beach stretch many bathing houses, and thousands of men, women and children are to be seen along the shores of the blue Mediterranean every day

during the summer. It is around Jaffa that the orange industry has grown and thrived, and continues to expand so rapidly. For miles around it the Plain of Sharon has been transformed into a vast orange grove from which millions of cases of the golden fruit are being obtained each year. The supply of electric power to the cities through the development of the Rutenberg works has stimulated the growth of many smaller industries that are helping to bring prosperity to the country.

When all has been said about the growth of Haifa and Jaffa it is Jerusalem that holds the centre of interest for the majority of visitors to Palestine. It is the Holy City that is the mecca of all tourists, the shrine at which multitudes worship in spirit and the place their eyes long to see. And yet it is safe to say that Jerusalem is a sore disappointment to multitudes of tourists, and we do not mean non-Christian tourists either. Thousands who visit it every year come away with the feeling of disappointment and disillusionment. It is not what they expected. Just what people do

expect it is difficult to say. The old city within the walls remains much the same as it was two thousand years ago. Its streets are narrow, dirty and smelly. The lame, the halt and the blind still beseech alms, though many of them are neither as lame nor as halt nor as blind as they pretend to be. At any rate the lame can show remarkable agility and the blind astonishing clearness of vision when a policeman in khaki appears on the scene. Still they are there, beggars innumerable, and afflicted with many diseases. Through the gates of Jerusalem flows all the colour and life of the East. To stand at the Jaffa Gate and watch the current of life as it flows by is a bewildering and fascinating experience. A perfect babel of tongues is to be heard. Armenians, Jews, Greeks, Parthians and Medes, English and American, with most of the languages of Europe. The costumes are often as diverse as the tongues, and the whole makes an unforgettable impression upon the mind of the visitor who sees it for the first time. What then creates the feeling of disappointment with the Holy City? I am inclined to think it is the disappointment at the commercialising of the religious sites. Protestants, particularly, become disgusted with the obvious frauds that are perpetrated in the name of the Christian religion, and the veneration that is paid to sites of the most dubious authenticity, and the superstitious awe in which they are held tends to disgust the person whose faith is grounded upon the more sure realities of spiritual things. It is not the land, nor the city, so much as the religious sites, that creates the feeling of disappointment in many hearts. To visit the

in Jerusalem or the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, to see the hatred that is manifested between the sects controlling these edifices, the zeal for the traditions that men have made, and the multitudes of shrines and altars that are without any warrant in Scripture, history or even common sense, tends to make the visitor disgusted with religion as it is manifested in Jerusalem. And yet the city itself can exercise a spell over mind and heart that only deepens with each successive visit. Is it not after all the Holy City, the greatest of the cities of the earth, the city that was wept over by our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, the place where also He was crucified and where our redemption was accomplished? For these reasons if for no other Jerusalem must always claim the chief interest of man among the cities of the earth.

As we look out upon the situation before us to-day the difference between the world's view of modern conditions and the Church's view of modern conditions is just this: The world is looking out to-day and seeing its civilisation crumble in a night; and the Church, seeing that, is looking with the eye of faith right up through the clouds, and sees Christ crowned, and knows that, somewhere or other, somehow, sometime, Christ will make all things new.—L. The Weakness of Wordiness.

"I'm telling you what I'm saying," screamed an open air speaker a few evenings ago, and every line of his features was strained with intensity as he said it. But what did it amount to? Nothing! He was talking for talking's sake. The following reference to a certain Irish poet is appropriate here:

As a talker he had no equal—provided the fountain was permitted to play without interruption and he was not required to descend from the sublime to the particular. A statesman listened to him politely awhile on one occasion, and then, as the spate of words showed no signs of diminishing, suddenly whipped pencil and notebook from his pocket and said briskly, "Your point please?" A sort of dreadful shiver passed through the room. One woman moaned slightly. Sacrilege had been committed; the holy of holies violated. The abashed host hastily dragged the wretched politician to one side and explained that asking "A. E." for his point was simply not done.

Ye gospel preachers, never let this be said of you or your message. Stand up, speak up, and shut up.

The Place of Victory.

But there is an experimental significance also in the repeated affirmation of Scripture that our Lord sits at the right hand of God. We must never fail to bear in mind that the work of Jesus, since He took our nature into union with Himself, is as the representative man. As such He died, and rose, and reigns. And just in proportion as we are one with Him by a living faith, we also shall die, and rise, and reign. Such thoughts were burning in the heart of the apostle, when he said, "God raised us up with Him, and made us to sit with Him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus." As the cathedral dome rears itself above the roar and strife, the smoke and mist, the slush and dirt of the streets—above the lounge of the idle, the hurry of business men, and the cry of the huckster and city Arab—so it is the purpose of God that we should sit with Christ and in Christ; that we should share in His triumph, His reign, and especially His rest; that we should drink deep draughts from the crystal depths of that river which washes the foot of the eternal throne.

Palestine and Prophecy

Gathering His Outcasts.

EVENIEEN thousand Jews of Turkey, that is, a third of the Jewish population of that country, have applied for emigration certificates to Palestine. The reason for their desire to emigrate is the bad economic and political conditions now prevailing in Turkey. God is using all kinds of economic conditions to fulfil the word of Isaiah xxvii. 12, "Ye shall be gathered one by one, O ye children of Israel.'

Returning to Zion.

"Two thousand halutzin (pioneers) are scheduled to leave Warsaw during the new two weeks," says the Jewish Daily Post. "Every day packed trains (which, incidentally, now all have kosher dining cars attached to them) are leaving Warsaw en route to Palestine. The farewell scenes at the railway stations are the happiest scenes in Polish Jewry at present. There is dancing and singing of the Hatikva, and exclamations of joy. According to the official statistics about 89,000 Jews have emigrated to Palestine from Poland since 1920." The Lord has said concerning Zion, "I will gather the remnant of My flock out of all countries whither I have driven them" (Jer. xxiii. 3). And surely this prophecy is being fulfilled before our eyes.

Child Victims of Race Prejudice.

The following is culled from the Jewish Chronicle: The appalling effect of persecution upon the Jewish children in Germany is illustrated by the following firsthand stories:

- "At a street corner a little girl did not dare to pass by a horse, standing with its forelegs on the pavement. Her sister tried to calm her, and said: 'Go on, don't be afraid; the horse does not know that we are Jews.'"
- "A nine-year-old child neglected herself entirely; she did not wash any more, did not take care of herself at all. When remonstrated with, she replied: 'What does it matter?' I am only a Jew.'"
- "Others languish for their former fellows of the German school. Said one of these: 'Mummy, may I look over the fence sometimes, when my old class is doing gymnastics?"

The grim prediction, "Among these nations shalt thou find no ease . . . thou shalt fear day and night ' (Deut. xxviii. 65, 66) is being fulfilled.

Health in Palestine.

If Palestine is ever to become the home of a healthy people, then drastic measures must be taken to combat the dangers of malaria fever. The glory that was Greece, the riches of Babylon, the power of Persia are all things of the past and in a great measure their decay and decline can be put down to the ravages of Palestine under the Turk had many such malaria zones, the low-lying ground round the Sea of Tiberias, the coastal plain and the Jordan Valley were all breeding grounds for malaria mosquitoes. Before it can ever be said that the people shall not say, "I am sick" (Isaiah xxxiii. 24), great reforms must be

undertaken and these are being done with remarkable success. The following cutting from the Jewish Daily Post shows the latest work that has been undertaken:

The Government Department of Health is engaged in large reclamation and anti-malarial schemes in the area known as Birket Ramadan, Wadi Falik (situated on the coastal plain between Cæsarea and Tel Aviv), with the objective of rendering the place fit for extensive agriculture and making it healthy for human habitation.

When the work is completed more than 8,000 dunams of land which for centuries have been malarious marsh-land, will be like fresh and fertile soil.

A visit by the writer was made on the spot which was intended to learn how the work is being carried out. Mr. Samaha, representing the Government Department of Health, showed us around and discussed the method of draining by means of dynamite. Candles of dynamite were inserted a metre deep into the mud over a distance of about a hundred metres and were detonated by electricity.

The resulting explosion opened up a canal of 100 metres in length, and it remained for the workers to flush the mud from above the water of the marsh to produce a drainage canal. This I found to be straight and well-graded.

I obtained a general view of the work already accomplished from a sandstone hill through which a deep cutting in rock had been made to allow the water to pass by means of a canal, already constructed before the winter rain, of two kilometres in length to the sea.

A sluice through the hill which had been cut in Roman times and part of an ancient Roman monastery were unearthed during

the excavation and were shown to us.

This is only one small portion of the land that has been drained, and the official report for 1934 states that not a single death from malaria occurred in Jerusalem in 1934 as compared with 113 deaths in 1918.

The report also points out that the Government has allotted £18,000 from its 1935 estimates for fighting malaria, and cites the decrease, noticeable all over the country, in the incidence of malaria patients from 7 per cent in 1922 to 183, or under 1 per cent in 1934.

Thus while the children of Israel are returning to the land, the land itself as the result of energetic measures is becoming fit to live in and thousands of acres of malaria swamps are becoming cultivated land bearing large crops. (See also Isaiah lxi. 4, 5; Ezek. xxxvi. 33-36).

Bear Your Cross

The Lord Jesus Christ says you cannot be His disciple unless you take up your own cross and bear it after Him-not waiting until it is forced upon you, not struggling to get rid of it; but as you accepted Christ on the Cross, so accept Christ in the happenings of each day you live. He wants you to realise that discipleship means the willing acquiescence of your will in His. First of all, supreme love; next, a willing acquiescence in God's will for you, in God's call to you. Bear your cross. That is it.—Dr. W. Y. Fullerton.

FROM OUR MISSIONARIES IN SPAIN

THIS intensely interesting and illuminating report comes from Pastor and Mrs. Thomas in Spain. They write:—

Every day we are reminded that the Roman Catholics are gaining back their power which they lost with the declaration of the Republic more than four years ago. Last month the feast of Corpus Christi was celebrated here; the procession paraded the streets, carrying the Host as in the days when the Roman Catholics were in full power. It was the first time for the feast of Corpus to be celebrated publicly in this town, since the declaration of the Republic. On the same programme announcing the feast of Corpus, there was the announcement that in the afternoon there would be a bull-fight, and in the evening dancing in the open.

It was all part of the feast; in the morning the people paraded the streets dressed in their best clothes, some walking in the procession and others looking on; then in the afternoon the same people went to the bull-fight and at night to the dance, bringing to a fitting conclusion a feast which reminds one of the idolatrous customs of the heathen. The Roman Church teaches that the wafer, after consecration, is really and truly Christ. It is this consecrated wafer that is carried in the procession and worshipped in the feast of Corpus Christi. Father Vaughan, preaching in Westminster Cathedral, and as quoted in the Roman Catholic newspaper Tablet, 19th February, 1910, said: "The same body which Mary cradled on her bosom that

far-off Christmas night, the same life which breathed to the Magdalen, 'Go in peace, thy sins are forgiven thee,' the eyes of which rested lovingly on the rich young man in the Gospel, the hands which blessed the little ones and traced the mystic writing on the sand, the brow which bled beneath the crown of thorns, the hands and feet which yielded to the piercing nails, the gaping wound which told of a heart broken for the sins of men. All were there in the sacred Host."

While the feast of Corpus Christi was being celebrated, our little company of believers gathered together for a time of real praise and worship; not to worship our Lord through the wafer, but to worship Him in spirit and in truth. While we were rejoicing in the presence of our living Saviour, the words of the Lord through the prophet Isaiah, chapter xliv., were brought very clearly to our hearts and minds, and the burning words seemed to apply to the Roman Church to-day, quite as much as they applied to Israel in the days of the prophet Isaiah.

Since last writing we have been to other towns and villages, distributing the Scriptures and tracts. At the first of these we found the people more or less indifferent, but we sold one hundred Gospels and placed booklets and tracts in every home. We have received one request for more literature from this village.

The following week we went in another direction to a village that we had not visited previously. We learned that some colporteurs had been there some time before. One woman told me that she had bought a book similar to what we had from one of these men and her boy had shown it to the local priest, who ordered him to burn it as it was a bad book; it was evidently a New Testament. The woman purchased a Gospel from me and accepted some booklets after

I had explained what they were. So long as the people are led by the priests, there is not much hope of them receiving the gospel with its glorious message of salvation. In this place we sold sixty-six Gospels and one New Testament. The poverty was extreme and I am sure that many did not have even the small sum of ten centimos—a little less than our penny—the price asked for the Gospels.

asked for the Gospels.

Last week we went to another village where we again saw evidences of extreme poverty. One woman called me into her house—it was more like a stable than a house—and asked me to read from the booklets and tracts that I had given her. Some of her children were in the house naked be-


children were in the house naked because they had no clothes to cover them. Again the question was asked: "How could God be a God of love to allow some people to live in luxury while others did not have enough to eat and to put on?" In many homes we were able to talk about the Lord Jesus and sold eighty-four Gospels and seven New Testaments.

This week we went to a town that I visited last summer; we came in contact with communists who would have nothing to do with our literature and laughed and ridiculed at the truths of the Gospel. They did not have it all their own way and before we left them they were more serious. Others were more kindly disposed and accepted our booklets and tracts and purchased Gospels. In numbers of the homes the people said they still had the books that I had given them a year ago. We sold here eighty-three Gospels and four New Testaments.

During these summer months the heat is intense in the south of Spain, but we are making use of our opportunities to scatter the Word of God in this district, looking to the Lord to bless His own.

N instance of childhood comes to mind, which proves how simple but believing prayer can overcome the powers of Satan's kingdom.

In a little cottage meeting one night a few of the Lord's own were gathered for fellowship and prayer. A middleaged man living next door to this home had once followed the Lord, but had repeatedly fallen into one of his old habits of drinking.

Pleading by friends was of no avail. He was discouraged. Again and again he had vowed he would not touch strong drink any more, but again and again he

failed. He had been invited to the prayer-meeting that night, but almost rebelliously he refused, letting his friends know that he preferred them not to be concerned about him. It had been about settled in his mind that he would make no more profession-it was no use, he thought. He would stay at home and go to rest, prayermeeting or no prayer-meeting.

But it was not for him to say nor decide. In the prayer-meeting next door the children of the Lord were appealing to the throne of grace on his behalf. They could no longer persuade him, but they would speak to the Lord about his soul. Earnest prayers arose to the throne. The throne pray-ers were kneeling together near

the centre of the room (fire always burns better when the wood is packed well together).

While the presence of the Lord was blessedly realised in prayer, suddenly a sound was heard at the back door. All at once into the meeting rushed the man for whom they had been earnestly praying. He came in his stockinged-feet, having begun to get ready to retire. Sinsick he threw himself upon his knees in the midst of the pray-ers and cried out to the Lord for mercy.

It does not take God long to do a mighty work. In a moment the man was again rejoicing in the longrejected Saviour of sinners, and the pray-ers, too, were weeping for joy. So manifest and real was the power of God in their midst, that the man was directly snatched out of the enemy's clutches.

While the believers were gathered about him in thankfulness and rejoicing for answered prayer, and for the miracle wrought in their midst through the power of the Spirit, the man, too, with closed eyes, breathed out praises unto Him who had broken the power and chains of sin that had bound him.
