

Blazing the Trail

of the Glory of the Risen Christ on Easter Monday in the Royal Albert Hall

For the eleventh year in succession Principal George Jeffreys faced three monster congregations in the Royal Albert Hall. As on other occasions, sinners wept their way to the Cross, bodies received healing, believers were baptised in water, and the final meeting saw the great hall packed from floor to roof for another ever-memorable communion service. Amongst the large number who testified to miraculous healing were forty-six cripples, forty-four who had been delivered from growths, and fourteen from blindness. Thirty-four nationalities were represented at the demonstration—all one in Christ.

EASTER, 1936, was proclaimed by some papers to be the coldest, bleakest Easter for thirty-five years. The Bishop of London (Dr. Winnington Ingram) did not dispel the chilliness of the Easter atmosphere when in his sermon in St. Paul's Cathedral on Sunday evening he referred back to Easter Day in 1918 and said: "The present Easter has the gloomiest outlook in all the eighteen years since." Before he closed his address he remarked that "the future of the Christian religion was not too cheery a prospect." Then, as if to increase the pessimistic gloom of the sunless day his closing remark ran as follows: "Judging from the human point of view he would have no hope for the world, which was working up to a cataclysm which threatened to be the end of civilisation." This, taken from the *Morning Post* of Easter Monday presented a strange contrast to the atmosphere of consecrated, contagious happiness found in the Royal Albert Hall on the same day during three momentous services conducted by Principal George Jeffreys in that time-honoured building.

At the morning service there was a sense of unruffled serenity in the sweetness of hallowed worship, and one became conscious of joyous, vibrant life per-

meating the whole of the vast hall. The opening hymn: "Up from the grave He arose" was sung with exultant triumph by thousands of men and women whose radiant, beaming faces proclaimed as eloquently as their voices that they were rejoicing in a living personal Saviour who had triumphed over death and the grave and who was now living as their representative at the Father's right hand in glory. No pessimistic clouds of gloom here, but rippling waves of praise and adoration ascending to heaven to gladden the heart of the risen Christ. Miss Joan Holman's solo contributed to the deepening of the worship note as she sang with tender, pleading pathos: "Come unto Me ye weary." One was deeply conscious that Someone was in possession of the perfectly controlled voice and through the pleading message was uncovering His heart of yearning tenderness to every listener.

Principal Jeffreys then took over the meeting, addressing the audience from the story of the healing of the blind man in John ix. With direct emphasis he dwelt on the fourth verse of the chapter: "I must work the works of Him that sent Me while it is day; the night cometh when no man can work." Fresh from the field of battle in Blackpool where hundreds

have been saved and many notable miracles of healing witnessed in his last revival campaign the voice of the speaker carried with it resolution and endurance as he pictured the dark night of judgment ahead and the shortness of the time to labour for the Master now. In this Coming of Age Year, on looking back over the twenty-one years, he said, the retrospect has proved the faithfulness of God in keeping His Word, tens of thousands have been converted, homes have been changed, lives transformed. The earnestness of purpose underlying the speaker's vivid portrayal of truth (from which conventional methods were refreshingly absent) became manifest as he uncovered potent points in the treatment of his subject, by which he wanted to grip both learned and unlearned in his audience and bring their minds to focus on outstanding facts. He showed clearly that there was a personal Devil and that sin and sickness *did* exist. But, he said, though sin and sickness do exist we have a personal Christ who sanctifies. If we have sin we have real sanctification. If we have sickness, then come into touch with a living Christ with healing in His wings. And they did. Thirty-six came into touch with Christ for salvation at the close of the service, and large numbers of suffering ones, we believe, were touched by His power and delivered as the Principal prayed with them.

Reverently solemn and beautiful was the afternoon baptismal service. The massed Crusader Choir's excellent rendering of "Keep the touch of God in your soul" was descriptive of the attitude of the vast audience throughout the whole meeting, the note of solemn worship being increased by Pastor P. N. Corry's beautiful message in song: "Deeper in Thee, dear Lord." Principal Jeffreys again ministered the Word in the power and demonstration of the Holy Ghost, as a result of which twenty-seven hands were raised to signify their acceptance of God's great salvation. It was marvellously unique that the candidates for baptism came up out of the font in front of the platform radiantly happy and composed. They had of a truth the touch of God in their souls as they joyously obeyed their Lord's command in going through the waters of baptism, identifying themselves with Him in His death and resurrection.

The evening meeting disclosed a scene in the Royal Albert Hall never to be forgotten. In the midst of a world frenzied with fear, sickened and satiated with sin, reeling under its weight of sickness and sorrow, heading to its doom, in the finest hall in the Metropolis

of Britain's great and noble Empire were gathered a people the majority of whom were in vital touch with God, a people who loved their Bibles, a people to whom Easter excursions and Easter enjoyments meant nothing. They had come to worship God; to lay their lives afresh at the feet of Jesus—His bondslaves for ever. Their souls had been gripped by a greater attraction than anything earth could offer. Every eye in that crowded building was upon the man who was now addressing them. He had been raised up, an apostle of God, and had been the means of the salvation of very many of them.

His teaching was so clear and direct on uttermost consecration and deepest sanctification, breaking down all stilted theories of men and artificial limitations of surrender to God, that the audience in the Royal Albert Hall,—feeling that God had so used him to bless their lives in the past—were now stretching out hungrily to receive fresh help from the God they loved, through His faithful servant in the evening meeting.

For twenty-one years, consistently and continuously, with unwavering fidelity, Principal George Jeffreys had been building up in the hearts of his converts spiritual forces from which their chivalrous devotion to God and to God's eternal Word was only the outward phenomenon. He stood before them on the Royal Albert Hall platform as one who was already standing in the presence of a grander and nobler audience. His message: "The

effect of the Gospel on four characters in the Book of Acts" was at one time tender and appealing and with sweet musical rhythm and cadence, then again the Holy Spirit's power came so mightily upon him that it was like the opening of a battery upon his congregation.

There was originality of conception in his unfolding of the scene of Paul's trial before King Agrippa, which carried tremendous power of conviction to the hearers in the crowded house before him. We saw not Paul the prisoner, but Paul the preacher, not making his defence, but with the sword of the Spirit in hand taking the offensive in the name of his God. One could almost sense the spirit of conviction that seized the august and divinely-planned assembly. One could almost see the fading glory of Agrippa's crown as it receded before the oncoming glory of the King of kings. The earthly throne was seen to totter, fall and pass away before the enduring nature of one that had been established for ever. The jangling of the chains that bound him was music to his ears, because the Lion of Judah, his peerless Lord and Master, had broken

seeing loved ones, long prayed for, being saved, will never end. Will there be another Easter Monday's glorious Foursquare Gospel Demonstration in the Royal Albert Hall, we wonder? God alone knows. His programme is made out. We await the unfolding of His plan. Thank God for the memories of this day. Thank God for Elim's twenty-one years' march with Him under the inspired leadership of Principal George Jeffreys.

To our faithful God be the glory for all that He hath wrought all down the passing years of our history.



“Grannie” Walshaw, who is over fourscore years of age, was there in her usual place on the platform, and it was with considerable enthusiasm that she entered into the birthday rejoicings of this great work: “I have been healed for longer than many have been alive,” she exclaimed joyously. She was marvellously healed some fifty-one years ago—an invincible argument for the reality and durability of divine healing. On her left we found a newcomer—a Methodist Evangelist of far-reaching experience; it was his first visit to the Easter Demonstration and his contact with the Elim work had been established through the hearing of a sermonette on the Foursquare Gospel by the Principal on one of the Elim Records. It was then that he was definitely convicted of

and is now devoting his wholehearted labours to the Elim work. In common with the thousands gathered

divine display and demonstration of the reviving power of the risen Christ. After a most impressive solo, entitled “I heard the voice of Jesus,” by Miss Joan Holman, the Principal took his place at the microphone to deliver the first message of the day. Basing his remarks on John ix. 1-4, which refers to the healing of the man born blind, he emphasised the need for faithfulness and loyalty in Christian witness and work for God. “I must work the works of Him that sent Me while it is day; the night cometh when no man can work,” said the Master. The dark night of tribulation is speedily approaching, and as believers in the Lord Jesus Christ we have little time left for service. The stage is already set for the drama to be enacted; the important question is “Am I faithful to God?” for above the din of battle,

declared the Principal, “I hear a voice from the Throne saying, ‘When ye see these things begin to come to pass, look up, and lift up your heads; for your

redemption draweth nigh.' Hence we are to work the works of God," he added. "What are the works of God?" he asked. "They include the preaching of the message of a crucified Christ; of an empty tomb; and of a risen Lord."

In his Epistle John declares these words, "For this purpose the Son of God was manifested that He might destroy the works of the Devil." "People would have us believe that the Devil is not a reality. I say Satan is real . . . sin is real . . . sickness is real—but, thank God, divine healing is real," declared the Principal emphatically, "and if you will let Him in, He will give you life and then bodily health." To this solemn appeal thirty-seven responded to the call for salvation.

When the Principal appealed for the testimonies of those who had been healed during his campaigns, forty-six cripples signified that they had been delivered; forty-four healed from cancers and various growths and fourteen who had been healed of blindness, and thousands of hands were raised signifying that they had been healed of various complaints and ailments.

It was a very sad and touching scene when at the end of this service—for nearly an hour, the sick filed down the western side of the building into the arena, which was filled over and over again with those who sought a touch from the Lord, and after the Principal had prayed over them many returned on the other side with rays of

expressed upon their countenances.

The afternoon service was unique and of special interest to all Foursquare Gospel believers. The beloved Principal had laboured so wholeheartedly for the Foursquare Movement and for the uplifting of men and women. His untiring efforts have been signally owned of God, and his twenty-one years' ministry has been the means of inestimable blessing to tens of thousands of people all over the world. As a leader of this Movement, his unrivalled sacrifice for the work of God; his uncompromising devotion to the divine truth and his genuine and unquestionable humility, has left a deep impression upon all his fellow-ministers and has inspired them to unwavering loyalty to the Master and His work. He is honoured and loved by all, and as a little token of appreciation and continued devotion the Headquarters Staff, together with all the Ministers of the Foursquare Gospel Alliance, decided to make him a presentation of an illuminated address, suitably inscribed and bearing the signatures of Members of the Executive Council.

It was with very mixed feelings that Mrs. George Kingston, the beloved wife of the first Elim Minister to be ordained in England, made the presentation to the Principal, and the whole congregation were deeply moved when she said, "We owe much to you, Principal; we thank God for you and may He bless and use you mightily for many years to come."

In a remarkably unassuming manner the Principal accepted this recognition of his work accomplished

and added that it was just another reminder of

where all would be rewarded for their deeds.

The Crusader Choir followed with an inspiring rendering of the Coming of Age hymn composed by Pastor D. B. Gray, and after a very searching address by the Principal, on the danger and seriousness of nursing unbelief, which hardens hearts and hinders the reception of God's blessing and benefits, and when in conclusion he asserted with great confidence that in the Royal Albert Hall there were thousands who believed that God is still the God of the miraculous, there were thundering responses from all over this great building. There were twenty-seven more converts at this service, and thirty-six candidates, including a Doctor of Philosophy, passed through the waters of baptism.

The soul-stirring waves of revivalism reached high tide in the evening service. From floor to roof hearts and throats gave forth voluminous praise at this, the final meeting of the day. It was discovered that there were thirty-four nationalities represented in that gathering, and after a French, a Welsh and an English prayer the whole congregation joined in the singing of the "Hallelujah Chorus," as "Hallelujah" is the same in every language.

"*Nefoedd ar y ddaear*" (heaven upon earth) ejaculated the Principal; "*Bendigedig*," was the Welshman's response, as the divine Presence filled that great auditorium.

Basing his remarks on Paul's address (not defence) before Agrippa, the Principal gave a very dramatic,

on the need of a definite decision for God. Referring to the Coming of Age of the Elim work, he said, "Twenty-one years ago we launched the Elim Foursquare Gospel Ship. The winds have been beating upon her, she has struggled with tempestuous seas, but for twenty-one years it has been sailing on and thousands have been landed safely on the eternal shore of Life. Singularly enough there were twenty-one conversions at this service. Then followed a glorious communion service, which is the inevitable and almost indispensable culmination of every Foursquare Gospel Demonstration. A deep impression was made on the hearts of all present at this great service. What hush—what reverence pervaded the whole of that congregation when the London Crusader Choir hummed the tune of that wonderful hymn, "When I survey the wondrous Cross"; this great Coming of Age Demonstration was very appropriately concluded by the singing of that well-known hymn, "Jesus may come to-day." The waving of the demonstration sheets, which were in four different colours, at the close of this remarkable service, was indeed fraught with very suggestive symbolism. Like thousands of emigrating birds which take their flight to realms of sunshine, the fluttering of these sheets suggested the glorious translation of the saints at the coming of the Lord—which is at hand.

Tuesday, May 5th. Psa. xlv. 1-11.

"Be still, and know that I am God" (verse 10).

No command makes a larger demand upon the consecration of the child of God. The flesh is full of a ceaseless energy, ever seeking to manifest itself in one

form or another. Restlessness is an enemy to true spirituality; the soul that would dwell deep in God must be prepared to be silenced; a great hush of the Holy Ghost must pervade the life through which the Lord would speak His authoritative revelation. Every thought and desire must be brought into obedience to the sovereignty of Christ. It is only within this creative stillness that God can reveal Himself to the seeking soul. Hark, O my soul, to the voice of Thy Lord. Wait thou upon Him until He breathes upon thee the breath of life, quickening thee into union with Himself.

Be still my soul, thy Lord would speak,
And grant that thy heart doth seek.

PRAYER TOPIC:

Elim's "set-apart" day of prayer. That the solemn, sanctifying influence of these "prayer days" be felt in church membership throughout Elim, marking us as a movement where holiness of living and increasing spiritual power are plainly evident.

Wednesday, May 6th. Psa. xlvii. 1-9.

"He shall choose our inheritance for us" (verse 4).

How rich the souls who thus allow God to choose their inheritance; whose lives are made up of the things that the Lord has bestowed. In vain we plan our own path, seeking to secure that which we fondly hope will give substantial joy to life. Eagerly we stretch forth the hand of selfish desire, feverishly attempting to grasp the prize which we imagine will make us permanently rich. And yet we have to learn, sometimes through humiliating experience, that it is only those things which God Himself brings into the life that can yield abiding blessedness. O Master divine, lead Thou me on into all that Thy perfect will holds for the obedient soul. Set Thou the bounds of my habitation and establish Thou the work of my hands.

I would not miss one thought of Thine,
But always take Thy choice for mine.

PRAYER TOPIC:

Praise for encouraging reports from our beloved missionaries on the distant fields and for God's blessing upon their physical condition.

Thursday, May 7th. Psa. xlviii. 1-14.

"He will be our guide" (verse 14).

Whatever life's prospect may be, with such a guide we may contemplate the oncoming days with a sense of perfect rest. The future may contain many an hour of crisis and conflict, but He will always be our stay and our strength—our Shield and Salvation. The God-guided life is always one of deepening wonder. He leads His own into pastures new and fresh; pastures of abundance and of delight. It is this assurance of divine guidance that gives to Christian life and experience a spiritual sublimity and splendour that saves from littleness, lift-

ing it on to a plane of purity and nobleness. Grant that this day, O Lord, I may realise Thy guidance in the commonplace things of life. Let me trace Thy leading in all that crosses my path throughout the moments and the hours, until at eventide my soul shall be filled with Thy praise.

Saturday, May 9th. Psa. 1. 16-23.


"Whoso offereth praise glorifieth Me" (verse 23).

The Ministry of the Printed Word.

WHAT a great blessing to the world and help to the Church of Jesus Christ has been the development of the printing industry. Thousands of souls have been won for Christ directly through the agency of the printed message. Through the years the Holy Spirit has honoured the silent ministry of tract, leaflet and book. These silent messengers have penetrated where no human voice could reach with the message of God, piercing the darkened mind of man, bringing him the word of truth and life, and revealing to him the way of deliverance from the thralldom of sin and self. Could we but ascertain the amount of real spiritual work accomplished by this means it would, we believe, prove amazing. In Christian evangelisation the printed word is a great factor in arousing the interest of the people, and calling attention to the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Genuine Christianity.

CHRISTIANITY is not a voice in the wilderness, but a life in the world. It is not an idea in the air, but feet on the ground, going God's way. It is not an exotic to be kept under glass, but a hardy plant to bear twelve manner of fruits in all kinds of weather. Fidelity to duty is its root and branch. Nothing we can say to the Lord, no calling Him by great or dear names, can take the place of the plain doing of His will. We may cry out about the beauty of eating bread with Him in His kingdom, but it is wasted breath and a rootless hope, unless we plough and plant in His kingdom here and now. To remember Him at His table and to forget Him at ours, is to have invested in bad securities. There is no substitute for plain, everyday goodness.

Better than Worshipping the Bible.

THE Bible is not a thing to be worshipped. A savage might bow down to a telescope, but an astronomer knows better. The way to know it is to use it. It is not to be looked at, but to look through. To bind a Bible beautifully, to lift it reverently, to speak of it with admiration, to guard it with all care, is not at all to the point. Look through it. Find God with it. See what God was to the men of the Bible, and then let Him be the same to you. See the proofs of His power, and prove that power for yourself in yourself. Search the Scriptures for the testimony of Jesus, and honour them by being an honour to the One they reveal.

An Earnest Life.

AN earnest life must have a great purpose. Christ had such a purpose, and no life can be earnest without such a purpose. A little purpose will not do. It needs a purpose as mighty as that of the Lord Himself, the purpose that brought Him down from the glories of the Throne, and made the sacrifice of His life not too dear in the light of the eternal glories which are to come forth in the unfolding of redemption. Have we a purpose big enough to call out the whole strength of our life?

There must also be a single purpose. No great life can be divided or distracted between two objects. As long as Moses "looked this way and that way" he was useless for his high calling. But when he turned his back on Egypt, and on the opinions of his fellow men, and "endured as seeing Him who is invisible," God could use him to break in pieces the powers of earth and hell, and to lay the mighty foundations of a great nation, and a greater revelation. No man can serve two masters. A very ordinary life must prove tremendously effective if it is all on one side, and wholly concentrated upon one supreme purpose. Have you a single purpose? Have you just one thing to do, to please Him that hath called you, to finish your work, to fulfil your trust, and to win your crown?

An earnest life involves a constant purpose. It is the interruption that breaks the power. A very little jar will stop the knitting of the bones in a broken arm. A faint uprooting will kill the delicate tendrils that are reaching out into the soil, beneath that tender plant. Give it time to get rooted, and grounded, and settled, and it will bear the blast of the hurricane and bear its precious fruit for a century to come. Earnestness must have a purpose that never fails, a goal that shines like the sun in the heavens, or the pole star in the sky, undimmed through the passing years, and lifts the mind and heart above every allurements and every fear, to the eternal goal, as it cries, "None of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself that I may finish my course with joy and the ministry which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God."

But, above all these considerations, the supreme secret of an earnest life is the baptism of the Holy Ghost. The living coal from the altar of fire, the living heart of Jesus Christ Himself beating within our breast, and making us as earnest as He, because it is not we, but Christ who liveth in us.

The Royal Boxes at the Albert Hall were again placed at our disposal on Easter Monday. The courtesy of the majority of the holders of boxes and stalls in permitting the use of their seats is gratefully acknowledged. In a few cases permission is withheld, and this explains the few empty seats.

Faith is to believe what we do not see, and the reward of this faith is to see what we believe.—Augustine.

A Day of Inexpressible and Irrepressible Gladness In the Presence of the King

ANOTHER Easter Demonstration has come and gone, leaving us with a rich legacy of memories which will serve as a gracious stimulus for the service of coming days. Each demonstration imparts to the movement which it represents new vision, fresh spiritual inspiration and added proofs of the power of God in present-day Christian experience. It was a demonstration of the eternal efficacy of the gospel in the sphere of human need. No one could possibly attend gatherings such as these and not realise the impact of tremendous spiritual influences which must leave their lasting seal upon life and character. It is remarkable the way in which these meetings retain their power to bless and attract. Although this was the eleventh annual demonstration yet the tide of enthusiasm rose as high as ever.

It is most difficult to describe all the deep emotions and impressions which such fellowship arouses. To give a detailed description of all that transpired would occupy far more time and space than we have at our disposal. Each gathering was packed with that which deserves the reporter's attention.

One might well be asked what was the most profound impression created during such a wonderful day of fellowship. Yet this is a question far from easy to answer. Upon reflection perhaps that which made its deepest impression upon the writer was that most delicate and subtle of all the elements which combined to make up such a glorious day, viz., *atmosphere*. One was conscious of being enveloped in that indefinable yet nevertheless inescapable atmosphere of the Divine. To put it into Foursquare phraseology—God was in the midst. Pervading that great assemblage was a sense of the all-environing and indwelling presence of Jehovah. In such an atmosphere all things were possible. Those thousands of worshipping souls were within reach of the creative touch of the eternal God. There was the breath of resurrection in the air—Easter joy lent its glory to the occasion—souls were on the wing, mounting into the heights with God.

The morning meeting with its emphasis on the healing aspect of the Gospel was instinct with the power and presence of God. One realised the Spirit of the Lord generating a deep compassion for the sick and suffering who came in such large numbers to claim

the virtue of Christ's healing touch. As those rows of silent sufferers knelt in the arena of that great auditorium one could almost sense the overshadowing of Omnipotent Love. Like some modern Pool of Bethesda those suffering men and women flocked to be ministered to in that name of the Healer Divine. And as Principal Jeffreys moved amongst those bowed suppliants it was evident that God had indeed given to him a ministry to the afflicted among men. It was the anointing from the risen Lord resting upon him that gave efficacy to his ministry to the diseased with whom he dealt.

It was a moment laden with tender emotion and in which a deep spirit of loyalty found expression as the great congregation rose to sing "God save the King." Since last year's Demonstration one beloved Sovereign has passed to his rest and reward, and his honoured son now sits upon the throne of this vast Empire. Once again the King in response to the telegram sent from the Demonstration replied in gracious terms expressing his appreciation of their loving and loyal message.

The afternoon service witnessed the immersion of a number of believers who gladly availed themselves of this opportunity of publicly confessing their Lord and obeying His Word. The Principal gave a most searching message, the

rapt attention and hearty response revealing how deeply the preacher's words had gripped his hearers. Those thousands of eager upturned faces, so expressive of the intense interest awakened, provided an eloquent tribute to his power of presenting the inspired truth. To remain unstirred under such impassioned and inspired preaching was well-nigh impossible. Behind each utterance was the dynamic of desperate determination and intense conviction born of a transforming vision of God.

The evening service proved the climax to a day remarkable for divine manifestation. The two preceding gatherings were more or less preparatory and introductory to this huge meeting. The vast throng which filled this noble hall were caught in the glad transport of worship, and gave themselves up in unrestrained abandon to the spirit of that holy hour. 

the people swelled in the closing hymn, "All hail the power of Jesu's name."

The meetings were again crowded during the week, souls getting saved each night, bodies healed from sickness and disease. It is wonderful to note that through the whole campaign there was a deep atmosphere that completely shut out all lightness or frivolity. The people were seeking food and did not come just to pass an hour away.

The following Sunday I again made my way to the Opera House. Again it was packed to overflowing. Before his message the Principal gave one or two testimonies of healing.

He described how that twenty-one years ago whilst in Ireland he was called to pray with a young man suffering with tuberculosis. He was accompanied by a doctor who stated there was no hope for him. That man was miraculously healed. You ask, "Do these healings last? Of course they do! That man is in this meeting," said the Principal, and one of our eminent pastors stood to his feet. There was a

and gasps of amazement escaped from the lips of many. Cries of "Hallelujah" and "Amen" rang through the hall. The Principal then called upon several who had been healed during his campaign in Blackpool. One little girl had been paralysed from birth and after being prayed for the mother found that the irons on her arms and legs would not fit. She was compelled, therefore, to take them off. At her mother's request the little girl raised her hand to show how completely she had been healed.

Another notable healing was that of a sister who had suffered for 9½ years. Her joints had been drawn together and she had been unable to walk. What a change to see this sister full of joy and health. She moved her body and arms just to prove the truth of what had been said.

Another sister who suffered from deafness had also been wonderfully healed. It would take pages and pages to narrate all the miracles of healing that have taken place, but to say that the great audience in the Opera House was moved is to put it lightly. The air

rang again and again with fervent expressions of thanks and adoration to our God who not only hears but answers the prayers of His people.

Through it all the Principal preserved a most humble attitude, giving all the glory to God.

His message was the first of a series on the Second Coming of Christ. Hearts beat with fear and trepidation at the wickedness of this sinful world and lifted up in thankfulness as the great

was unfolded in planning the way of escape. The signs of the times were dealt with showing how near is the return of our Lord. The air was again charged with power, women sobbed audibly and strong men broke down and cried under the conviction of the Holy Spirit.

It would be a pity to close without mentioning the Sunday morning communion services. How near to God one feels in these services. There is such a sweet, blissful atmosphere of adoration. How lovely it is to remember the death of Him who loved us enough to give His life for us. How lovely it is to pour out the heart in adoration and praise. How lovely to remember the risen Christ and soon-coming King! Each one leaves the Temple with the feeling that "it has been good to be found in the house of the Lord."



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
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


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
