

There was much blessing when Pastor A. J. K. Magee (Ilford) was the special speaker on a recent Decision Sunday, and sixteen members of the school made decisions to accept Christ as Saviour.

Leyton Sunday School continues to grow and God is richly blessing the united efforts of the School's teaching staff.

Blessings continue to be poured out on the people and work at SELLY OAK and at the recent Fellowship Meeting we were pleased to hear of financial records in every department. Attendance also has increased in all meetings and seven new members received the right hand of fellowship, five being young people of Crusader age.

At the Sunday School prize giving it was a joy to see the children, with smiling faces, receiving their prizes. The older scholars, when they reach the age of fifteen, are presented with a bound Bible with their initials, and encouraged to join the Crusaders.

LESLEY'S ADVENTURE. By Beth Coombe Harris. (Published by Victory Press. 5/-, postage extra).

This indefatigable writer has given us a grand book for girls aged about 9-13 years. It should appeal to this group as it concerns the adventures of a young girl among a doctor's family. Enticing mystery surrounds the heroine's lost father. The message of salvation is made very plain, and teachers can gain much from the sound, wise approach. The problem of gambling is well dealt with. The story is true to life, except for the impossible name of Petronella Killigrew, and a present-day household, containing one old lady, looked after by four maids, two gardeners—and a coachman to drive her about in a horse-drawn coach. These purely secondary points apart, this is a truly good book for the important folk for whom it is intended.

HISTORY, PROPHECY AND GOD. By Robert Rendall. (The Paternoster Press. Price 8/6. Postage extra. May be obtained from the Victory Press).

As its title suggests, this book seeks to show that history and prophecy are but different aspects of the same process, and that both have their culmination in the Cross, the decisive point where human sin and Divine love meet. Man's sin is an act of undisguised hostility, from which there is no retreat. Initiative for further action lies not with man but with God, and He demonstrates His love and power in raising Jesus from the dead. The writer shows that Scriptural history and Divine prophecy show a pre-determined plan leading up to the Cross. By the Cross, through grace, an amnesty has been proclaimed to mankind, and God is bestowing a free pardon to all who accept the Son, but to those who do not accept that pardon from the Cross, the Man of the Cross will judge them in righteousness. The writer comes back again and again to the fact that history and prophecy can only be interpreted in the realm of human personality and personal decision. The book is well worth reading.

THINGS TEMPORAL and THINGS ETERNAL

Pastor who visited England in 1952 for the World Conference, says of a visit to Persia:

"I marvelled at the 'ganat' and the 'foggara'—the extraordinary system of underground waterways—which generation after generation of socialist workers has maintained and extended for the past 5,000 years in Persia and Syria. The shafts follow underground water courses to sources in the mountains sometimes as much as thirty miles distant. For centuries the workmen digging these shafts have taken their bearings with a primitive form of compass which probably ante-dates the marine compass by several hundreds of years."

The Indian Prime Minister, Mr. Nehru says of Christianity and the work of Christians in India: "Christianity is part and parcel of the background of this land as any other religion. We ask nothing from them except their loyalty and we know we have it. We know they will help us to raise our standards in integrity and service."

He calls Christians "enlightened children of India", and what a confidence he has in them to raise up the standards in integrity and service. May Christians realize their responsibility and walk circumspectly and worthily of the name they bear.

Tobacco Makes Bug Poison

A tobacco company firm in U.S.A. sent packages of cigarettes to high school boys accompanied by this explanation: "We are sending you a pack of our finest cigarettes. We hope you use them to your satisfaction and want more."

One of the boys wrote back, "I received the cigarettes and used them to my satisfaction. I soaked them in a quart of water and sprayed our bug-infested rose bushes. Every bug died. The cigarettes are sure good poison. I want more next spring."

Widely-known Chicago minister, Dr. Kenneth Hildebrand, is reported to have married more than 1,000 couples in his twenty-one-year ministry. Each year he holds a "Wedding Bells" service in which couples may come to renew their wedding vows. Approximately 100 attended this year's service and many from all over the country sent greetings. "Emotional and spiritual immaturity" is one of the major obstacles to a successful marriage, says Dr. Hildebrand.

According to the "World Christian Handbook," recently published, less than 30 per cent of the people in the world are called Christians, and 60 per cent of the nominal Christians are Roman Catholics. Christians in the world number over 700,000,000 out of a population of some 2,400,000,000. Roman Catholics number about 400,000,000.

In case the world is again plunged into war, man's dearest treasures, priceless works of art, the irreplaceable historic scientific, and cultural objects may be protected by a symbol—a painted shield of royal blue and white conspicuously placed on the places where the objects are. Almost all the great nations of the world, including Soviet Russia and her satellite countries, have signed a solemn pledge to respect the symbol.

Sun will explode

The end of the world may happen when we least expect it, a distinguished Spanish scientist, Father Ignacio Puig, said in a lecture at Gerona, Spain.

Father Puig said: "The world will come to an end when the sun explodes as a result of its nuclear pressure and becomes a 'new star.' The world will be on fire and pieces of the sun will hit the earth's surface in the form of a rain of stars."

Gospel Recordings

A unique enterprise in the service of the Gospel is being carried on by the inter-denominational, evangelical organization known as "Gospel Recordings" in Los Angeles. The purpose of this Society is to provide gramophone records containing the Gospel message in the many tribal languages spoken by small minorities and mastered by comparatively few missionaries. They also supply a cheap gramophone in order that nationals themselves may use the records. Miss Joy Ridderhof, Founder and Director of the organization passed through London in February on her way to Africa. Miss Ridderhof has only recently returned to the United States from a two years' visit to the Antipodes and India in the course of which recordings were made in 1,000 languages.

Carey and Calcutta

Last November the 146th anniversary of the Carey Baptist Church in Calcutta was celebrated. In recent months there has been spiritual quickening in the church, and crowded congregations containing many young people and students are attending the services. On a recent Bible Sunday a text of Scripture was recited in twenty-seven languages and dialects, indicating the representative nature of the fellowship. The church has a missionary outlook and is also closely identified with Youth for Christ work in India. Visiting preachers during the year included Dr. J. Edwin Orr and Mr. Norman Grubb.

Not the Same

You're not the same person you were a year ago. A Government research scientist has said research with new nuclear aids showed that 98 per cent of the basic material in the human body was replaced yearly.

Methodists Support Race Segregation

The North Alabama Methodist Conference, in session, passed a resolution supporting segregation in schools. "It is our honest conviction that it is for the good of both races that separate schools for whites and negroes be maintained," the resolution said.

The Conference also called for continued segregation in the Methodist Church. "The independent negro churches who handle their own affairs are in the ascendancy among the negroes," the resolution said, "Independent Negro Methodist churches and independent negro Baptist churches comprise the great majority of negro church members in the United States. Hence, we believe that it is in the interest of the negro members of the Methodist Church that they continue as a separate Central Jurisdiction."

Heart Full of Joy

When Haydn, the great composer, was asked on one occasion why his sacred compositions had such a glad ring, he answered, "I cannot compose anything without it; for I translate into music the state of my very heart. When I think of the grace of God in Jesus Christ my heart is so full of joy that the notes fairly dance and leap from my pen."

To Inform the Public

Begun January, 1955, "The Converted Catholic Magazine," published in New York, has embarked on a great national campaign to inform the Christian public on the plans, purposes and programmes of the Roman Catholic Church.

The magazine is edited by converted Catholic priests and monks and brings to the public the truth about Catholicism. To introduce its enlarged edition to the Christian public it offered free of all cost a three-month subscription to the magazine, beginning January, 1955.

Billy Graham on B.B.C.

Billy Graham will broadcast in "Lift up your hearts" in the Home Service of the B.B.C. at 7.50 a.m. from March 28th to April 2nd.

Natural Hot Water

Thirty years ago Icelandic engineers tapped their country's hot springs to heat houses in Reykjavik, the capital. Today, Iceland's expert is in Mexico on a United Nations technical assistance mission, which aims at exploiting natural hot water supplies in three thermal areas. Italy is another country which has harnessed the steam from hot springs. Eight per cent of the country's electricity comes from this source. Through the United Nations the technical "know-how" is being extended to other countries with natural hot water which can be developed.—"Christian Herald."

School Principals

Boston, Massachusetts, has more than one hundred public school principals. According to a reliable informant, not one is a Protestant and only one is a Jew, the latter in charge of a school for the deaf which no other eligible wanted.

Ministers and Missionaries

The United States has some 250,000 ministers of the Gospel, while only 18,000 American Protestant missionaries are serving the rest of the world.



STOP! LOOK! LISTEN!

AS WE TRAVEL along the roads and lanes of our lovely English countryside it is not unusual to see posted at certain points a notice, prominently displayed and bearing the warning injunction, Stop! Look! Listen!

Why should we be called upon to halt when maybe we are in a great hurry? Why tarry when we desire to forge ahead? Because the notice indicates that here is a point of danger, a place of choice. Across our immediate pathway runs a level crossing where high-powered railway traffic roars along at intervals. Even if the gates are open for free passage it is well to stop and make sure that the line is clear, to look for an oncoming train, and listen for the humming vibration that sounds clearly along the line when possibly the train is yet out of sight. Yes, it pays to stop, look, and listen at these danger points. Tragic accidents have been known to happen at level crossings.

Turning to the Book of Habakkuk in God's Word, we find the spiritual counterpart of this familiar warning. Habakkuk was a puzzled man. He knew that the people of his own nation were dealing wickedly and disobeying God; yet, when he took the matter to God in an anguished burden of supplication, the disconcerting answer given was that these people were to be overcome and punished by the invasion of a nation yet more idolatrous and evil than themselves. Bad as Habakkuk's countrymen were, they were God's chosen people, and in verse 13 of chapter i. the prophet expresses his bewilderment that God should allow "the wicked to devour the man that is more righteous than he."

Some adjustment of outlook was necessary. Habakkuk's decision to attempt this adjustment is recorded in verse 1 of chapter ii: "I will stand upon my watch, and set me upon the tower," (Stop), "and will watch to see what He will say unto me" (Look), "and what I shall answer when I am reproved" (Listen).

As he paused before God, looking to Him and listening with deep reverent attention, at least two mighty truths were borne upon the prophet's understanding. One was that, though the human mind is incapable of comprehending the complete work of the Almighty God, yet even so,

He was fully to be trusted. In effect God was saying, "Habakkuk, though My methods are incomprehensible to you, I have the situation in hand. You are not to be troubled, for 'the just shall live by his faith'" (verse 4). Another wonderful revelation granted was, that these troublous times were to end some day in the defeat of evil and the triumphant establishment of God's glory throughout the whole earth (verse 14).

Habakkuk **stopped**. He **looked** to God and saw that faith in Him was the only requirement during his present difficulty. He **listened** to the infinite One, and heard the distant vibration of the sounding Trump of God heralding the coming of the Lord. And the short, expressive Book of Habakkuk ends in chapter iii. with a perfect paean of joyful trust and victorious faith. Conditions around might present a depressing enigma—but God was still GOD, and His Almighty hand would yet bring order out of chaos.

Can we not today find a parable in the sign at the level crossing; a message in Habakkuk's watch-tower vigil? For there is so much to discover if we STOP and consider the state of our world at present. Are not the events of our time, the fast-moving events of the first half of this twentieth century, collectively, but the insistent warning of God to a heedless humanity? Oh, that men would stop in their wild rush for pleasure, their quest for wealth, their thirst for ambition's fulfilment. So much can be discerned of deep spiritual significance as a pause is made to LOOK at the signs of our times with eyes enlightened by the truth of God's Word. With spiritual ears tuned in to LISTEN, the very voice of God can be heard in these things, for they are signs promised by our Lord Himself to be given immediately prior to His Second Advent, and are happening now with startling rapidity and exactitude. These portentous events are surely thundering a final warning to mankind: "When ye see these things come to pass, then"—ah what then? The tenderness of the remainder of the sentence is for the child of God only, "Then look up, for your redemption draweth nigh."

Why stress this injunction, "Stop, look and listen?"

Because there is every indication that divine intervention is about to break devastatingly across the path of human planning and endeavour. The warning is plainly discernible for all who will heed, and now too, all who choose may share in the glad safety of salvation. The Lord Jesus Christ still waits to receive sinful men into the fold of His eternal love. But soon, how soon we do not know, though quite possibly sooner than even the most watchful Christian anticipates, the Word of the Lord, as proclaimed in

I. Thessalonians iv. 16 will be miraculously fulfilled, "The Lord Himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the Archangel, and with the trump of God."

Christ is coming again. He has promised, and He will keep His Word. The statement found in Habakkuk ii. 4 is repeated by the writer to the Hebrews, but with the significant alteration to the personal pronoun: "Yet a little while and **He** that shall come will come, and will not tarry," and with His coming, this day of God's free grace will finally close.

As you read these words, if you have never seriously thought upon God's "sure Word of prophecy," then now, NOW, before it is for ever too late, Stop! Look! and Listen!

Habakkuk had his reward. He tells us, "The Lord answered me," answered in such a way that the burden of doubt and perplexity was banished and replaced by a joyous faith and trust. And the God who comforted the prophet is the same today. Still He gives His Word of consolation and help to each prayerful heart, and much that is puzzling to us, and full of dire foreboding, loses its terror and dread as we take time to wait upon the Lord.

Nobody suggests that the warning notice at the level crossing is useless and should be taken down. It is recognised as being an essential help to road safety. How much more should we give heed to the warning regarding our eternal safety, and, ignoring the demanding clamour of material attractions, seek to understand the spiritual "midnight cry" that, even now, is heralding the Bridegroom's approach. "Behold, the Bridegroom cometh!" Are you ready for His glorious return?

Why Many People are Afraid to Die

THE CASHIER at the corner grocery store asked me a question one day that may be burdening many hearts.

"Seeing that you are a minister," she said, "you should be able to answer this question: Why is it that people are afraid to die?"

I replied: "I suppose that people are afraid to die because they dread what lies beyond. But you know that Paul never expressed any dread of death, even when he was on his way to Rome and to martyrdom. Paul said that for him to live was Christ, and to die was gain; and also he wrote that to depart and to be with Christ was far better than this life. So you see that if our faith is in Christ we need not fear death."

"Yes, but you don't know whether you will escape judgment and go to be with Christ, until after you die," the cashier said. "No one can know that."

"But you can know with full assurance that Christ will receive you when you die," I replied. "'He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life,' That 'hath' indicates present possession. You see, Jesus, on Calvary's Cross, provided the way of salvation for everyone. He bridged the gulf that separated us from God. You will remember that His second to last statement on the Cross was: 'It is

finished,' and there is nothing else we can do but accept that atoning work which Jesus completed for us there. We are accepted on the merits of His work, not ours."

I paused to see if the cashier had any further question; but she only looked at me inquiringly. So I continued:

"This matter of one's salvation is not a matter of our feelings, nor is it a matter of our work; but it is a matter of faith in Jesus Christ. God promises life through His Name. To doubt God's Word is to make God a liar."

Just then another customer came along and had to be looked after; so I left the store, praying that God might, by His Spirit, lead her into the Way of Life through His Son; and trusting that I shall have another opportunity to leave more of God's Word for her to consider.

Do you fear death? Is it not because you have never accepted the gift of life that God so freely offers you? Will you not believe God's infallible Word regarding the provision He has made through Jesus' atoning work on Calvary's Cross? The following are Scripture references that substantiate what I told the cashier, and may be of help to you. (John iii. 16, 36; v. 24; vi. 37; xix. 30; I. John v. 10, 12, 13).

Clouds without water

W. LEON TUCKER

The book of Jude uses more extraordinary, original and unique figures of speech than perhaps any other book in the Bible. It speaks of "raging waves of the sea," "wandering stars," "trees whose fruit withereth," and "clouds without water, carried about of winds" (Jude 12). In these he make reference to the apostates of his day; they are good figures of speech concerning the apostates of any day. Those men who deny the things which are revealed in the Holy Scriptures are clouds without water. Clouds without water leave nothing. So ministers without the Gospel make a desert where faith should blossom like a rose.

1. Men who exalt human reason above divine revelation are "clouds without water."

It is not what man reasons, it is what God reveals. It is not what man thinks, it is what God says. The mind of man can never discover the heart of God. By wisdom this world has never come to know God. God's wisdom is foolishness to men, and man's wisdom is foolishness to God. We are not left to reason. We have a revelation. There are no dark secrets in the Gospel. He who runs may read. Christianity differs from world religions in that they seek after God while Christianity is God seeking man.

2. Men who exalt human attainment above divine atonement are "clouds without water."

Attainment is possible to man. Atonement is possible

only with God. Attainment is what man can do. Atonement is something that God alone can do. Attainment is within man's power. Atonement is in the power of God only. Attainment make man appear better before man, but atonement is the means by which man may appear before God without guilt or sin. Attainment has for its big word "character." Atonement has for its big word "cross." Attainment makes for education. Atonement makes for salvation. Attainment is for the mind. Atonement is for the soul. Be not a cloud without water!

3. Men who exalt human philosophy above divine prophecy are "clouds without water."

Philosophy is what man thinks he knows. Prophecy is what God foreknows. Philosophy is man's little candle which a gust of wind can blow out. Prophecy is God's lamp, which shines in a dark place until the day dawn. Philosophy is a maze from which man never emerges, while prophecy is light upon every step of the believer's pathway. Philosophy knows a little about the here and now, while prophecy knows about the hereafter.

4. Men who exalt human advance above divine advents are "clouds without water."

The world does not advance without Christ. In His absence it takes the down grade, not the up grade. With Christ out of the world there can be nothing permanently better in the world. It is not human advance, but the divine advents that have brought into the world help and holiness for man. Be not a cloud without water. Let God's thoughts be sufficient for you. Think God's thoughts after Him.

I was surprised when the person said, "You say the Lord has healed you of chest trouble, it is a mystery why you are still deaf." (I am able to lip-read). Since I gave my heart to Christ it has been impossible for me to question the ways of the Lord, it is not for me to probe the mystery, but to go on believing that all things are possible and to be content to leave all in my Saviour's hands. He alone holds the key to all my problems and I am happy in His redeeming love. What can I say but . . . "The Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord!"

Scripture Union Portions. Notes by Pastor H. Burton Haynes

SUNDAY, March 27th. Luke xx. 19-26.

"They watched Him" (v. 20).

Our Lord's life was lived each day under the close scrutiny of His enemies. They looked to see if they could find any faults in His character and speech; they cunningly laid traps hoping in some way to entangle Him in His replies to their crafty questions; they came upon Him when they thought He would be unprepared. He was never off His guard. And we cannot afford to be off our guard either. Our lives too are being watched. It is a fearful thought. How easy it is to let the Lord down by some inconsistency. As Christians we need to cultivate a close walk with the Lord so that our lives will show forth His praise.

MONDAY, March 28th. Luke xx. 27-47.

"He is not a God of the dead, but of the living" (v. 38).

Resurrection is the glorious hope we cherish in our hearts concerning those who "sleep in Jesus." Spring with its newness of life and freshness of beauty is one of Nature's parables of this great miracle awaiting the Christian Church. As Nature clearly teaches us, in the Resurrection there will be some correspondence between the present life and the future, but there will also be certain differences. "In the resurrection they neither marry nor are given in marriage." Spiritual affinities alone will bind people together. What is earthly and sensual in our love will be purged away. Although glorified we shall not cease to be human. Recognition is implied in the title: "The God of Abraham."

TUESDAY, March 29th. Luke xxi. 1-11.

"This poor widow hath cast in more than they all" (v. 3).

The cross has provided us with a new standard of giving. When God gave His Son He gave His all, He had nothing more to give. So our giving now is measured, not by what we give, but by what is left over after we have given. Christian giving is sacrificial in its motive. Applying this standard to the widow's offering, our Lord said she had given more than all her fellow-worshippers, for they had cast into the treasury of their superfluity, what they scarcely missed, but she having given, had nothing left. It is not the amount that determines the quality of our giving, but the sacrifice our giving entails. And true sacrifice is the expression of love.

WEDNESDAY, March 30th. Luke xxi. 12-24.

"It shall turn to you for a testimony" (v. 13).

Persecution is inevitable for the devoted follower of Jesus Christ. The advocate of truth will be maligned by the purveyor of lies, the chaste in spirit will be reviled by all who traffic in licentiousness, the godly will be ridiculed by the people who do not fear God. A cross is the badge of discipleship. But how are we to react to persecution? Our Lord tells us to rejoice when we are evilly intreated, to count it an honour to suffer for His name's sake. Furthermore we are to see in the hour of persecution an opportunity of bearing witness. In simple dependence upon the Lord we shall receive heavenly wisdom for each step, and for every word of our confession.

THURSDAY, March 31st. Luke xxi. 25-38.

"Men's hearts failing them for fear" (v. 26).

A prevailing sign of the last days just before the return of the Lord is a universal dread created in the human heart by "looking after those things" which threaten to destroy the earth. Our Lord's prediction of the end days is coming to pass before our very eyes. Overshadowing the nations of the world is the ghastly spectre of atomic devastation with all its potential of incalculable sorrow and suffering. The sombre shadow lengthens as the Day of Grace draws to a close. The solemnity of the hour calls us to look up to the Throne for grace to enable us to live triumphantly and to witness daily to His glorious salvation.

FRIDAY, April 1st. Luke xxii. 1-13.

"Then entered Satan into Judas" (v. 3).

Judas must have toyed with the idea to betray Christ for the sake of base gain for some little while before he actually consented to the fell deed. Inner consent led to Satanic domination. We cannot be preserved in the hour of temptation if we carelessly and wantonly put ourselves in its way. If we do not retreat from temptation and flee to Christ for refuge we shall advance into it. And the further on we go, the more difficult it is to retrace our steps. Satan's subtlety should make us more wise and wary. We have not a fool to deal with, but one that hath wit enough to compass our destruction.

SATURDAY, April 2nd. Luke xxii. 14-23.

"This do in remembrance of me" (v. 19).

The Sacrament of Communion is the marriage ring of the union of the soul with God in Christ. The marriage ring does not make marriage more of a fact, it is a visible symbol which helps a wife to know the reality of the union and reminds both of the holiness of their vow. We please our heavenly Bridegroom when we wear upon our lives for all to see the ordinance of Holy Communion and seek by His grace to fulfil the sacred obligations it entails. Outward acts make inward facts more real.


