Conversions and Healings at Eastbourne

EASTBOURNE was the scene last month of an evangelistic campaign conducted by the Rev. Ken Matthew and party. The meetings were held in the Town Hall and continued in the local Elim Church. It was the writer's privilege to be present on the third Sunday of the campaign.

In this lovely seaside resort on the south coast there are probably more evangelical churches than in any other town of comparable size in the country, and consequently, as one would expect, the evangelist had in his congregation not only those whom these meetings were planned to reach—those without Christ and so in need of the salvation which He alone can bring—but also born-again believers of many denominations. In these circumstances it was most encouraging to look down on the congregation and observe the keen interest manifested in the full gospel message so faithfully proclaimed by the evangelist. Mr. Matthew was ably supported by E. R. Corsie, J. Lancaster and R. Lighton, and each member of the party in his own way added to the success of the meetings. The congregational singing, duets and testimonies all helped to create the right atmosphere for the preaching of the Word of God.

And the results? The very first day of the campaign saw seventy decisions for Christ, and on the

days that followed other souls surrendered to Him immediately the opportunity was given. It was apparent that a prolonged appeal was unnecessary, for the Holy Spirit was present in convicting power.

In addition to a steady stream of conversions, day after day there have been testimonies of the power of God to heal the body and to deliver from many kinds of diseases. At the end of most of the meetings a queue of sick and suffering people file up to the platform to receive from the evangelist the laying on of hands. During these times the praying congregation is quiet and sympathetic. Some families have special cause for thanksgiving. To quote only one case, a husband was saved and his wife and her mother were healed during the campaign. An interesting event the night we were there was the presentation to the evangelist of a deaf aid no longer required by one who had been completely healed of deafness.

The only hope for mankind today lies in a return to God. Reader, will you pray regularly and earnestly for our evangelists and help the work in which they are engaged, to the end that multitudes of souls may be won for Christ?

HEALING CAMPAIGN GOES ON AT ELIM

AFTER two weeks of intensive work in a public revival and Divine healing campaign, the Rev. Ken Matthew and his party held their final meeting in the Town Hall on Sunday night, though the work will continue until next Sunday in the Elim Church, Hartfield Road.

At this last service in the Town Hall, Mr. Matthew took as his subject "Is the collapse of civilisation imminent?" He declared that "Christ is coming back as literally as He went away."

Christ's life and death as well as His second coming had been foretold in the Bible thousands of years before. Christ must return to bring peace to the world.

Mr. Matthew told how the Jews had at length returned to Israel, as had been foretold, and he was confident that they would remain there even if they were attacked by other countries.

He believed that there would be a last world war in which nuclear warfare would be used and only the intervention of Christ would save the collapse of the whole world. He would return and gather up "the saved." Then He would establish His kingdom on earth.

The evening started with the singing of several choruses, and after the address members of the audience were invited to pray for the healing of the sick.

Before inviting those who wished to appear on the platform to receive a blessing and prayer for any infirmity from which they might be suffering, Mr. Matthew showed a hearing appliance that he had had sent him from a woman who said that after receiving Divine healing at one of the former services she no longer needed it.

Invited to stand up in the audience, she declared that she had been deaf for three years but could now hear quite well.

Mr. Matthew said that a number of cripples had been made to walk and three or four people had had their sight restored.

People in the hall who desired to have a prayer for healing said on their behalf next filed on to the platform.

One woman remarked that she had been to a meeting a fortnight before and received "Divine healing." She was now able to walk unaided. Another stated that she was much better. Both were again prayed for, as were a number of others, who first had a few words with Mr. Matthew.

Afterwards Mr. Matthew told a reporter that he had been impressed by the increased interest which had been shown in the meetings over the fortnight of the campaign's course.

Many people, he declared, had testified that they had been healed of their various afflictions, as "you yourself have seen tonight."

He pointed out that he and his party were all fully conscious of the great work done by nurses and the medical profession, and his work was in no way antagonistic to theirs. It was rather in addition.

He hoped that during the rest of his campaign held in Elim Church people would continue to attend to receive the message of the Gospel.

Hello Boys and Girls.

We are going to talk about Dr. Barnardo today, the man who was the friend of the homeless boys and girls of Britain. Oh yes, when he was alive there were many boys and girls who had no homes. "Where did they live?" you ask. Well, I'll answer your question by telling you a story about Dr. Barnardo.

When very young, Thomas Barnardo was converted and decided to become a doctor and then go abroad to be a missionary. While he was training in London he started a school for poor boys and girls. One night when he was locking up after his class he noticed one of the ragged little urchins still crouched over the small stove. "Come along and go home now," said Mr. Barnardo. "Let me stay here," pleaded the little boy. "I've got no home." Mr. Barnardo was so amazed at what the boy said that he replied. "Where do you sleep then?" "Follow me," said the little lad. "I'll show you." Mr. Barnardo then followed the boy through the slums and filthy alleys until they reached a high wall. This the boy immediately clambered up, with Mr. Barnardo close behind him. When they reached the top, there curled up all over a roof were eleven boys huddled up fast asleep. A few evenings later Mr. Barnardo addressed a great meeting and told the people about these poor homeless lads. Later he was asked if he could take some interested gentlemen to see these lads sleeping out. Mr. Barnardo led them to a dark and dirty yard. There wasn't the sign of a boy there, but Mr. Barnardo called out. "I'll give a halfpenny to every lad who will show himself," and what do you think happened? Out of all the old barrels and crates that were cluttering up the yard, seventy-three boys came crawling.

The Spirit of Christmas

THE spirit of Christmas is everywhere abroad again as in previous years. Almost everyone seems full of the joy that pervades the atmosphere at this time of the year—the joy that comes through giving to others and in the receiving of gifts. And what a difference it makes to the atmosphere in factories, shops, homes and on public transport—in fact everywhere. Yet one wonders if many people really think upon the true meaning of Christmas, what it really recalls and symbolises, namely the giving of the *supreme gift* of God, His only Son, the Lord Jesus, to a world of men and women unworthy of such love and consideration.

The craving of the human heart is for joy and peace, for that which satisfies and makes one happy and contented. It was, therefore, the purpose of God, in giving His Son, to bring real and lasting joy to the heart of mankind, for when Jesus was born the message of the angel was, "Behold, I bring you glad tidings of great joy, which shall be to *all* people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord." This being so, why is this joy lacking in so many lives today? Because it can be experienced only by those who have acknowledged the Saviourship and accepted the Lordship of Jesus Christ in their hearts and lives. Where the Saviour is enthroned upon the heart, the experience of the person concerned is similar to that expressed by the hymn writer:

"Now none but Christ can satisfy,

None other Name for me;

'There's love, and life, and *lasting joy*,

Lord Jesus found in Thee."

Men and women are spirit beings, living only for the time being in a house, the body, and this accounts for the failure of material things to meet and fully satisfy the inner craving of their hearts. God has made them with a part of their being akin to His own spirit, and only the coming of the Lord Jesus

into their lives can meet and lastingly satisfy their heart-hunger. Until that takes place they remain unsaved and unsatisfied.

The message of the Christian dispensation, of which we are particularly reminded at this season of the year, is that by the acceptance of God's gift, the Lord Jesus, into their hearts, men and women can become the recipients of that true and lasting joy spoken of by the angel and described by Peter as "joy unspeakable and full of glory."

I've never realised before the meaning of a "cat and dog life." Certainly they dwell under the same roof and belong to the same owners. Sally has chased Fluff, the cat, once or twice when she thought we were not about; otherwise she is most obedient and keeps back out of the way when we tell her to. I HAVE recently read some articles in religious magazines dealing with the subject of prophecy in relation to future world events. I notice that the writers of these articles take the view that there will be first of all a fulfilment of the prophecies contained in Ezekiel, chapters 38 and 39, and that according to these prophecies we will be plunged into a fearful war with Russia. Then there will be a lapse of some time, and finally all nations will go against Jerusalem to battle—this will be the great Armageddon (Zech. 14:2-5).

I do not agree with this interpretation of scripture regarding the coming of two great world wars, the first with Russia and her allies and the second when all nations come against Jerusalem. This latter one would not be a war, but a walk-over. I believe that the great war with Russia and her allies, as recorded in Ezekiel, chapters 38 and 39, will be the last war of this Gentile age. Anyone who takes the trouble to read the latter part of Ezekiel 39 will see that it is an end chapter. It deals with the end of Gentile world dominion and the full and complete regathering to their own land of the Israelites, their restoration to Divine favour, and the making with them of the new covenant. "Therefore thus saith the Lord God; Now will I bring again the captivity of Jacob, and have mercy upon the whole house of Israel, and will be jealous for My holy name. . . . Neither will I hide My face any more from them: for I have poured out my spirit upon the house of Israel, saith the Lord God" (Ezek. 39:25, 29). For further references in confirmation of this, see Jeremiah 32:37-41; 33:14-16; 23:5-8; Isaiah 14:1-17; Ezekiel 36:24-38; Romans 11:25-27.

Let us now turn to Zechariah 14:2: "For I will gather all nations against Jerusalem to battle; and the city shall be taken, and the houses rifled, and the women ravished; and half of the city shall go forth into captivity, and the residue of the people shall not be cut off from the city. Then shall the Lord go forth, and fight against those nations, as when He fought in the day of battle. And His feet shall stand in that day upon the mount of Olives, which is before Jerusalem on the east . . . and the Lord my God shall come, and all the saints with thee."

If that dreadful war foretold in Ezekiel 38 should break upon us right now, you would find that it would naturally work out as recorded in Zechariah. Russia and her allies would invade Palestine, and Syria would of course be on their side. Naturally enough they would be against Jerusalem. On the other hand, the Western allies would launch their attack against Russia, and Transjordan would be

on their side. "And Judah also shall fight against Jerusalem" (Zech 14:14, R.V.). Why will the Jews fight against the old city of Jerusalem? To take it from the Transjordan Arabs who now hold it. This would throw Transjordan against the Jews, and against Jerusalem. On the side of Transjordan are America and Great Britain. Consequently you would have all nations against Jerusalem—without any miracle taking place to bring it to pass. The only thing that is miraculous about prophecy is that it is

history written in advance. The events have always been ordinary and natural, following the usual course which nations generally take, and no doubt this will also be true of the future.

Although the Jews will no doubt fight desperately to take the old city, they will be beaten and forced to surrender. Then will be "the time of Jacob's trouble; but he shall be saved out of it. For it shall come to pass in that day, saith the Lord of hosts, that I will break his yoke from off thy neck, and will burst thy bonds." You may say: "How do you know it is the Jewish section which will be forced to surrender, and not the Arab section of Jerusalem?" Because the Bible says: "And half of the city shall go forth into captivity, and the residue of the people shall not be cut off from the city." "The city" is the part of Jerusalem which is inside the walls, and is held right now by the Arabs, while the Jews hold all of the city which is outside the walls. To the Arabs Jerusalem is sacred, for inside those walls are the Mosque of Omar and that most treasured rock where Abraham was about to offer Isaac when God stayed his hand. But the Mosque of

Omar occupies the site of Solomon's temple, the dearest spot on the whole surface of the earth to a Jew. Who can picture that fight between the Jews and the Arabs? But the Jews will be beaten, the white flag will be raised, and they will be taken prisoners. "Then shall the Lord go forth, and fight against those nations, as when He fought in the day of battle."

On that eventful day, away to the south, beyond the hills of Edom in the direction of Bozrah, you will see a strange sight in the heavens (Isaiah 63:1-7). A great light will appear which will move rapidly towards Jerusalem, and as you look more closely you will discern in it the form of cavalry: "And behold a white horse; and He that sat upon him

care to look up the following scriptures you will also see that it is a judgment on the ungodly (Isaiah 13:9-13; 24:3-6, 21, 22; 26:20, 21; 28:17-22; 34:1-4; 63:1-6; 66:15-18; Jer. 4:23-29; 25:26-38; Zeph. 1:14-18; Mal. 4:1-3).

Surely Isaiah, chapter 24, describes a world swept by atomic warfare, its inhabitants burned, and few men left. "In the city is left desolation," with no place where men may hide in safety (verses 17, 18). The chapter ends with the Satanic hosts in heavenly places and the kings of the earth cast into God's prison, and left there for many days to be punished. This surely agrees with Revelation 19:20; 20:2, 3, where the Devil and certain others with him are cast into the bottomless pit. The last verse in Isaiah 24 describes our Lord reigning in glory in Jerusalem. The following chapter describes His reception when He arrives on the earth.

As we see the dark clouds of judgment rolling up, filled with atomic thunder, ready to smash in pieces the nations, we know that the end of the times of the Gentiles is at hand, and we look forward with glad expectation to when that stone which was not of human origin shall fill the whole earth (Daniel 2:34, 35).

I also believe that before that awful day of judgment breaks upon the earth our faithful bridegroom, the Lord Jesus, will catch away His waiting Bride. If He remembered Noah and Lot and did not allow them to be swallowed up in the judgments which came upon the earth in their day He will surely remember us. The angel said to Lot: "Haste thee, escape thither; for I cannot do any thing till you be come thither." Jesus said: "Likewise also as it was in the days of Lot; they did eat, they drank, they bought, they sold, they planted, they builded; but the same day that Lot went out of Sodom it rained fire and brimstone from heaven, and destroyed them all. Even thus shall it be in the day when the Son of man is revealed. . . . I tell you in that night there shall be two men in one bed; the one shall be taken, and the other shall be left. Two women shall be grinding together; the one shall be taken, and the other left." Romans 8:1; John 5:24 and 1 Thessalonians 5:2-11 compared with Zephaniah 1:14-18 and Isaiah 26:20, 21 are very comforting to my soul regarding the saints of God and coming judgment upon this world.

During the blitz of London I was conducting a service in a shelter in Brixton in company with some of our people. That night there was the heaviest raid London experienced. The people in the shelter begged us not to go out in it, but to stay with them. We did so, and waited until about 1.30 a.m. The

was called Faithful and True, and in righteousness He doth judge and make war . . . And the armies which were in heaven followed Him upon white horses, clothed in fine linen, white and clean. . . . And He hath on His vesture and on His thigh a name written, KING OF KINGS, AND LORD OF LORDS. And I saw an angel standing in the sun; and he cried with a loud voice, saying to all the fowls that fly in the midst of heaven, Come and gather yourselves together unto the supper of the great God; that ye may eat the flesh of kings, and the flesh of captains, and the flesh of mighty men" (Rev. 19:11-18). How closely this language resembles that of Ezekiel 39:17: "And, thou son of man, thus saith the Lord God; Speak unto every feathered fowl, and to every beast of the field, Assemble yourselves, and come; gather yourselves on every side to my sacrifice that I do sacrifice for you, even a great sacrifice upon the mountains of Israel, that ye may eat flesh, and drink blood. Ye shall eat the flesh of the mighty, and drink the blood of the princes of the earth." It is quite clear that these two great prophets are describing the same scene, one in the Old Testament and the other in the New Testament.

It is surely evident that the preparations which are now being made for war would fulfil the word of God to the letter as to the destruction which is coming upon the earth at the close of this age. If you

damage around us was terrible, but the people in the shelter were preserved. The following Sunday, when we were again in that same shelter holding another service, some of our people were told that the real reason they did not want us to leave was that they felt they were safe while we were there. But when the trumpet sounds in the sky there will be no holding on to the people of God for safety's sake. We are the Lord's ambassadors of peace in this world, and while we are here judgment on a large scale is held up; but when we cross the border, look out—war will be declared immediately.

The people of the world have rejected God's peace terms for many centuries, and have cherished the ingredients of war in their souls. Dr. Albert Einstein, the noted scientist, said: "The real problem is in the hearts and minds of men. It is not a problem of physics, but of ethics. It is easier to denature plutonium than to denature the evil spirit of man. What frightens us is not the explosive power of the atomic bomb, but the equally explosive power of human personalities. Man's skills have outstripped his morals. His engineering has leaped ahead of his wisdom. We cannot cancel or call back his scientific advance, but we can and must, if the world is to survive, help man to catch up. In God's name, if you still believe in God, take Him seriously, and somehow get control of what science has given to the world, or else we shall all likewise perish."

Thank God that this present state of "nation against nation, and kingdom against kingdom" will not go on for ever. There is a day coming when "the Lord shall be king over all the earth; in that day there shall be one Lord and His name one" (Zech. 14:9).

Sunday, December 15th. 1 Corinthians 9 : 15-27.

"So run" (v. 24).

To the Philippians Paul said: "I press toward the mark"; years later he wrote to Timothy: "I have finished my course." He had not fallen out by the way, but had steadfastly endured to the end and looked now for the promised crown from the Lord's hand. Do not drop out of the race because of discouragement, but go through to the end. After enduring so much, do not let go the crown in sight of home.

Monday, December 16th. 1 Corinthians 10 : 1-15.

"God is faithful" (v. 13).

Do you feel that you have been tested and tried beyond the limits of endurance, and are you tempted to give up? Let the message of this verse comfort and sustain you; take it as a personal message to your own heart. Is there anyone who has ever accomplished anything worth while for God who has not been severely tested? God is faithful and He will bring to pass His will for you: rest trustingly in His hand.

Tuesday, December 17th. 1 Corinthians 10 : 16-33.

"Do all to the glory of God" (v. 31).

What a wonderful inspiration for every part of life. Paul assures us that we can even eat and drink to the glory of God! Life will become very wonderful and the everyday activities will be transformed if we dedicate all to Him. Does the work before you today appear drab and monotonous? Commit it now to Him with a thankful heart: even the kitchen will become God's house.

Wednesday, December 18th. 1 Corinthians 11 : 1-16.

"Be ye followers of me" (v. 1).

It is God who has called us and placed us in the Body, and if we envy the position of another we dishonour Him and harm the Body. It may be that we have not so conspicuous a position as another, but each of us is indispensable; if we discharge our calling faithfully God will commend and reward us.

YES! "Pentecost" is REAL Today

AMONG the strange and mystical events of history, and even among the fanciful tales of the world's most whimsical fiction, there is nothing to be compared with the unique experience to which we commonly refer as the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. Even in the realm of religion, where the supernatural is expected and no human being claims to understand fully every mystery of God's moving, there are constant questions and doubts concerning the teachings that are called Pentecostal. The word *Pentecostal* has been so tossed about that its actual meaning has become somewhat obscure, and some persons seem to be frightened at its sound.

Originally the Feast of Pentecost was a Jewish celebration, so called because the word means "fifty" and the celebration was held on the fiftieth day of the Passover. It was on the day of this feast

that the apostles of Jesus Christ were gathered, in obedience to His instructions, in an upper room in Jerusalem after Christ had ascended into heaven. As they waited there in one accord they heard the sound as of a rushing wind, tongues of flame sat upon them, and they began to speak with other tongues as the Holy Spirit gave them utterance.

Christian teachers generally agree that the portion of the book of Acts in which this account is given is an authentic part of the Scriptures. They agree that the event is historically true; that the apostles did have the experience as it is described; and that they did speak with other tongues as a direct result of Divine power.

We believe that the same experience is for all true followers of Christ who will seek power to do His work in the world today. We believe that the experi-

ence is important not merely because it enables one to speak in other languages, but because it brings a new power within. The power is given to all who diligently seek it for the purpose of carrying on the work of the Church. Those Christians who share this belief are called Pentecostal.

There are some who doubt that the experience of the apostles is for Christians today. They question the Pentecostal doctrines, saying that the experience was given once to fulfil a certain need, but that it is no longer necessary.

There is one answer to those who do not believe that the Pentecostal experience is for today. The answer is: God sees fit to give the experience to many persons. Why should this be true if the experience is not for today? There can be no doubt that many persons today do receive an experience which can be described as similar to that received by the apostles. Their testimony is adequate proof that the experience is for today. Since I am one of these persons, I should like to share my testimony with you.

When I was a girl of eighteen I was a sincere Christian. I was deeply devoted to the Lord and wanted more than anything else to please Him. I felt that He wanted me in some kind of full-time gospel service, and I planned to go to a Bible college to receive the training I needed for Christian work. The group of which I was a member taught the doctrine of a "second definite work of grace," which they called "sanctification." According to this teaching, there was a place which each Christian could reach where he would no longer be tempted by evil. All "root and branch" of sin would be removed so that the Christian could live a perfectly holy life, serene and secure and untouched by sin. I longed for this "sanctification" and sought it sincerely, confessing all my sins and shortcomings to God and man, praying, reading the Bible, attending every church service, fasting, until I was in a state of desperation. I almost decided I was not saved, or that I had committed some unpardonable sin, or that God would not give me the experience for some other reason.

While I was in this anxious, frustrated state of mind I was in an automobile accident and was taken to a hospital. In the mysterious way of providence, God allowed my path to cross that of a young Pentecostal Christian who was a nurse's aid there. She asked me if I was a Christian. I said, "Yes, I am leader of the young people's group at our church. I would like to have you visit us some time."

"I am president of our young people, too," she answered. "We call them the Christ's Ambassadors.

I belong to the Assembly of God. Let's trade visits. I'll come to your young people's meeting and you come to mine."

I agreed to the plan, and the first Thursday night after I was out of the hospital she called for me in her car. Although it was young people's night the church was almost filled. It seemed that everyone at the Assembly of God attended the Christ's Ambassadors meetings! But the young folk had charge of all the activities. There was singing such as I had never heard before. There was a testimony service which lasted for almost an hour! The C.A. president brought the message herself. At the close of it she invited the people to come to the altar to pray. Everyone went to the altar. In my church the altar call was made for sinners only, except at the services where invitation was given for Christians to seek sanctification. I knew most of these people must be Christians, so I concluded that they were going to the altar to seek sanctification. As they began to pray, I thought they sought it more loudly than was necessary, but I admired their earnestness. I thought I might as well go to the altar too, for I still desired more than all else to receive my sanctification.

I knelt as I had so many times in my own church. I prayed silently as I had prayed before. "Please, dear Lord, take me completely. Make me all Yours. I want more than anything else to please You and serve You acceptably in the place You will choose for me. Whatever You wish to do to me, do it. Make me whatever You wish me to be. Please give me Your grace and power, and let me feel clean and satisfied inside. I give myself to You completely. I don't know what else to do."

It was the simple, almost desperate prayer of a serious teen-ager, and I laid my head upon the altar in complete resignation, conscious of nothing but the presence of God.

Suddenly I seemed to relax. The hollow, empty frustration melted away and I was filled with love for the Lord, so that I raised my hands spontaneously toward heaven and praised Him with complete abandon. Where before I had always been a little uncertain of God's love for me, I now began to realise that He was indeed a loving Father, and He was right there with me to guide and help me, so that I was no longer afraid.

Although it was contrary to my nature to do so, I praised the Lord in a voice much louder than I had ever used in church before—and soon I was praising Him in strange syllables which I had never learned.

At first I was certain that what I had received was the experience of sanctification, but the people began to tell me that I had received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit—the experience of Pentecost (Acts 2:1-4). Although I had never heard of modern people receiving such an experience, I knew well the story of the Early Church, and I did not doubt that what these Pentecostal Christians told me was true.

The Baptism in the Holy Spirit has not been to me the emotional experience of an evening; rather, it has meant permanent peace and a sense of intimacy with the Lord. It has given me power and confidence so that I have felt that I can be of some use to the Lord and that He needs me in His service. It has given me the serene knowledge that I have found my place, and that God will guide me and direct me all my life. I have no fear of the future; neither do I fear I may fall away from the Lord. The indwelling of the Spirit makes me to know that what I have committed to God He will keep, and "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

Immediately after I received the Baptism I began to understand and enjoy the Bible more than ever before. The power of the Spirit within me seemed to make the Scriptures clear and the meaning plain—because He is the Spirit of Truth.
