ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY

John H. Armstrong

Achtemeier, Elizabeth. *Nature, God & Pulpit*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1992. A well-written homiletical corrective to the contemporary avoidance of God and the natural world. Helpful and suggestive.

Achtemeier, Elizabeth. *Preaching from the Old Testament*. Louisville, Kentucky: Westminster/John Knox, 1989. Most ministers have a much harder time dealing with the Old Testament than the New in their preaching. This volume offers a wonderful and practical guide to preaching narratives, Psalms, prophets, wisdom and law.

Achtemeier, Elizabeth. *Preaching from the Minor Prophets*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1998. A great resource for pastors who wish to take the message of the prophets seriously in their regular preaching. Combines theological depth with clear, simple language.

*Adam, Peter. *Speaking God's Words: A Practical Theology of Expository Preaching*. Downers Grove, Illinois: InterVarsity Press, 1999. Peter Adam, vicar of St. Jude's, Carlton, in Melbourne, Australia, lays a solid theological foundation for preaching that insists on three great pillars: God has spoken, his words are recorded in Scripture, and he commissions people to "explain, preach and teach his written words to their contemporaries." Highly recommended!

Adams, Jay E. *Studies in Preaching: Sense Appeal in the Ser-*

mons of Charles Haddon Spurgeon. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1975. This wonderful little book seeks to isolate qualities in Spurgeon that we can apply to our own preaching. Sadly it seems to be out-of-print.

Adams, Jay E. *Studies in Preaching: Audience Adaptations in the Sermons and Speeches of Paul*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1976. The second volume in this series in which Adams seeks to isolate positive features that can help modern preachers.

Adams, Jay E. *Studies in Preaching: The Homiletical Innovations of Andrew W. Blackwood*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1975. The third and final volume in this series. The chapter on "Theory of Imagination" is worth the price of the book since most modern preachers know very little about the use of imagination.

Adams, Jay E. *Preaching with Purpose: A Comprehensive Textbook on Biblical Preaching*. Phillipsburg, New Jersey: Presbyterian & Reformed, 1982. Adams, best known for his counseling emphasis, was an excellent teacher of homiletics. This is a useful book.

Adams, Jay E. *Truth Apparent: Essays on Biblical Preaching*. Phillipsburg, New Jersey: Presbyterian & Reformed, 1982. A collection of short and helpful essays. Includes some practical material rarely found in standard homiletical works.

Adams, Jay E. *Pulpit Speech*. Nutley, New Jersey: Presbyterian & Reformed, 1971. Analyzes several important features such as organizing content and acquiring a personal and distinct style.

*Adams, Jay E. *Preaching to the Heart: A Heart-to-Heart Discussion with Preachers of the Word*. Phillipsburg, New Jersey: Presbyterian & Reformed, 1983. This little booklet is worth its weight in gold. Rare is the pulpit ministry that aims intentionally from the heart to the heart. This

essay helped to frame my own thoughts considerably.

Allen, Ronald J., Barbara Shires Blaisdell and Scott Black Johnston. *Theology for Preaching: Authority, Truth and Knowledge of God in a Postmodern Ethos*. Nashville, Tennessee: Abingdon, 1997. Helpful in the way it addresses what the authors term "folk postmodernism," or that kind of worldview which most ministers face week by week. Encourages the style of conversation and dialogue. May provoke more conservative readers but it could help them think more deeply about their audience in preaching.

*Alexander, J. W. *Thoughts On Preaching: Being Contributions to Homiletics*. Carlisle, Pennsylvania: Banner of Truth, 1975 (reprint of 1864). The thoughts of a great nineteenth-century preacher. Immensely practical. Contains private correspondence on the work of the ministry that is classic.

*Azurdia, Arturo G., III. *Spirit-Empowered Preaching: Involving the Holy Spirit in Your Ministry*. Inverness, Scotland: Christian Focus Publications, 1998. This is a rare gem and one of the most important volumes on preaching in years. See my review in this issue.

Barth, Karl. Trans. B. E. Hooke. *The Preaching of the Gospel*. Philadelphia: Westminster, 1963. Practical theological material from the most famous dogmatician of the twentieth century. Includes a most helpful section titled "Preparing a Sermon."

*Barth, Karl. Trans. Geoffrey W. Bromiley and Donald E. Daniels. *Homiletics*. Louisville, Kentucky: Westminster/John Knox, 1991. Barth's thoughts on sermon preparation, including the way in which the faithful minister should preach Christ. He proposes that theology is nothing more than "sermon preparation."

Baxter, Batsell Barrett. *The Heart of the Yale Lectures*. Grand

- Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1971 (reprint of 1947). Provides a grand survey of the famous preaching series that is very well conceived.
- *Broadus, John A. Rev. by Vernon L. Stanfield. *On the Preparation and Delivery of Sermons*. San Francisco: Harper & Row, 1979. For well over a century this has been a standard in the field of homiletics. Broadus writes, "Preaching is characteristic of Christianity."
- *Brooks, Phillips. *Lectures on Preaching*. London: H. R. Allenson, 1904. Frequently reprinted over the years, this is a true "classic." Given originally as the 1871 lectures in the famous Yale Series on Preaching named after Lyman Beecher.
- Bryson, Harold T. *Expository Preaching: The Art of Preaching Through a Book of the Bible*. Nashville, Tennessee: Broadman & Holman, 1995. A helpful overview of the subject that makes a solid contribution for the modern expositor. Laid out as a textbook.
- Capon, Robert Farrar. *The Foolishness of Preaching: Preaching the Gospel Against the Wisdom of the World*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1998. Capon, an Episcopal priest, has written a number of popular books, especially a trilogy on the parables. This is a fresh and original work.
- *Chapell, Bryan. *Christ-Centered Preaching: Redeeming the Expository Sermon*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1994. This is one of the five best contemporary books on preaching in print. A must for every preacher who would handle Scripture in a proper manner.
- Clowney, Edmund P. *Preaching and Biblical Theology*. Nutley, New Jersey: Presbyterian & Reformed, 1975. Dr. Clowney is a masterful homiletician and this is a wonderfully useful little book. Sadly, it seems to be out-of-print again.

- Daane, James. *Preaching With Confidence: A Theological Essay on the Power of the Pulpit*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1980. Daane properly insists that the Word preached in the power of the Spirit is truly efficacious. This will put iron in the preacher's bloodstream!
- Dale, R. W. *Nine Lectures on Preaching*. London: Hodder & Stoughton, 1878. Another volume in the famous Yale University Lyman Beecher Series on Preaching. Out of print and still valuable.
- Dargan, Edwin C. *A History of Preaching (Two Volumes)*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1974. A helpful two volumes which are generally considered a standard on the subject. (See Turnbull for Volume 3, which completed the set.)
- *Eby, David. *Power Preaching for Church Growth: The Role of Preaching in Growing Churches*. Inverness, Scotland: Christian Focus Publications, 1996. If you believe the church should grow by the preaching of the Word this is the book for you. If you don't then you ought to read it and change your thinking accordingly!
- *Erickson, Millard, and James L. Heflin. *Old Wine in New Wineskins: Doctrinal Preaching in a Changing World*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1997. A much-needed book for sound-bite people who need doctrinal preaching now more than ever. This is a challenging and important book.
- Fant, Clyde E. *Preaching for Today*. New York: Harper & Row, 1975. Surveys every aspect of preaching from the role of the preacher to sermon construction and pulpit delivery. Fant was professor at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, and co-editor of the thirteen-volume *Twenty Centuries of Great Preaching*.
- Fant, Clyde E. *Bonhoeffer: Worldly Preaching*. Nashville, Ten-

nessee: Thomas Nelson, 1975. Included in this useful volume are ten of Bonhoeffer's own Finkenwalde Lectures on homiletics.

*Forde, Gerhard O. *Theology Is for Proclamation*. Minneapolis: Augsburg Fortress, 1990. Forde, a professor of systematic theology at Luther Seminary in Minneapolis, is a grand writer who understands the central place of proclamation in the church. Forde makes a great statement for preaching from Luther's *Bondage of the Will* and properly rails against all preaching which is apart from the Word.

Green, Christopher, and David Jackman, Eds. *When God's Voice Is Heard: Essays on Preaching Presented to Dick Lucas*. Leicester, England: InterVarsity, 1995. Sadly too few readers in North America will be able to find this book, published in the United Kingdom. Essays by Clowney, Carson, Packer, Peter and Phillip Jensen, and John Woodhouse, among others. Some superb material can be discovered here.

*Greidanus, Sidney. *The Modern Preacher and the Ancient Text: Interpreting and Preaching Biblical Literature*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1988. Will help the reader grapple with the various genres of Scripture by combining hermeneutics with homiletics in an incredibly helpful way. A must read for modern preachers.

Hunter, Archibald M. *Teaching and Preaching the New Testament*. Philadelphia: Westminster, 1963. Hunter, a professor of New Testament at Aberdeen for many years, was the author of many helpful popular works. The concluding section on P. T. Forsyth and Karl Barth demonstrates why they were two of the pulpit giants of the twentieth century.

Hunter, David G., ed. *Preaching in the Patristic Age: Studies in Honor of Walter J. Burghardt, S.J.* Mahwah, New Jer-

sey: Paulist, 1989. From its earliest times the church was devoted to preaching the Scriptures. These essays explore that commitment.

Jones, Edgar Dewitt. *The Royalty of the Pulpit*. New York: Harper, 1951. The definitive survey of the Lyman Beecher Lecture Series on preaching which commenced at Yale in 1871. An invaluable resource that makes it worth finding in a used book list.

Kaiser, Walter C., Jr. *Toward an Exegetical Theology: Biblical Exegesis for Preaching and Teaching*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1981. Kaiser seeks to close the "gap" that exists between academic exegesis and faithful, clear preaching of a sermon. A rich and clear text.

Kennedy, George A. *Classical Rhetoric and Its Christian and Secular Tradition from Ancient to Modern Times*. Chapel Hill: The University of North Carolina Press, 1980. A descriptive and full perspective from a historical and academic standpoint.

Ker, John. *Lectures on the History of Preaching*. London: Hodder & Stoughton, 1889. A classic study of the subject which is worth seeking in a used-book store.

Kerr, Hugh Thompson. *Preaching in the Early Church*. New York: Revell, 1942. A wonderful study of the preaching of Paul, Clement of Rome, Polycarp, Ignatius, Cyprian, Basil, Chrysostom, Ambrose, and Augustine.

Larsen, David L. *The Company of Preachers: A History of Biblical Preaching from the Old Testament to the Modern Era*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Kregel, 1998. 894 pages of readable material that often challenges and sometimes inspires.

Larsen, David L. *Telling the Old, Old Story: The Art of Narrative Preaching*. Wheaton, Illinois: Crossway, 1995. Story-telling is at the center of great preaching. Larsen, a

long-time professor of preaching, makes a good case for restoring narrative to a prominent place in our preaching.

Larsen, David L. *The Evangelism Mandate: Recovering the Centrality of Gospel Preaching*. Wheaton, Illinois: Crossway, 1992. Good evangelistic preaching is all too rare in our time. This is a helpful how-to on doing it.

*Lischer, Richard. *A Theology of Preaching: The Dynamics of the Gospel*. Durham, North Carolina: The Labyrinth Press, 1992. A theological "preface" which shows how theology informs preaching and how preaching as a kerygmatic, oral practical activity, informs theology and brings it to form.

*Lischer, Richard. *Theories of Preaching: Selected Readings in the Homiletical Tradition*. Durham, North Carolina: The Labyrinth Press, 1987. An overview of the preaching approach and special emphasis taken by a number of preachers; e.g., Phillips Brooks, C. H. Dodd, John Chrysostom, Richard Baxter, John A. Broadus, Charles G. Finney, Charles H. Spurgeon, John Calvin, Martin Luther, Helmut Thielicke, Jonathan Edwards, Karl Barth, and P. T. Forsyth. Extremely helpful.

Litfin, Duane. *St. Paul's Theology of Proclamation: 1 Corinthians 1-4 and Greco-Roman Rhetoric*. New York: Cambridge, 1994. What is the relationship between Paul's view of preaching and his underlying theological assumptions? Shows the striking contrast between Paul's style and that of first-century orators. A most important academic work for the modern "church growth" debate.

*Lloyd-Jones, D. Martyn. *Preaching and Preachers*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Zondervan, 1971. Lectures given by the famous London preacher at Westminster Theological Seminary, Philadelphia, in 1969. I have read this

volume four times and still find it worth reading again. Highly recommended, though at times eccentric.

Logan, Samuel T., Jr. *The Preacher and Preaching: Reviving the Art in the Twentieth Century*. Phillipsburg, New Jersey: Presbyterian & Reformed, 1986. An extremely useful collection of essays by eighteen modern contributors including Packer, Sproul, Boice, Clowney, Ferguson, Adams, et al.

Loscalzo, Craig A. *Preaching Sermons That Connect: Effective Communication Through Identification*. Downers Grove, Illinois: InterVarsity, 1992. The author argues that an effective sermon grows out of a pastoral ministry which identifies with the needs of the congregation on a personal basis.

MacArthur, John, Jr., and others. *Rediscovering Expository Preaching: Balancing the Science and Art of Biblical Exposition*. Dallas, Texas: Word, 1992. A collection of nineteen essays by faculty members of The Master's Seminary. Includes some immensely helpful work on the man who preaches the message.

Macleod, Donald. *The Problem of Preaching*. Philadelphia: Fortress, 1987. Donald Macleod, for many years the professor of preaching and worship at Princeton Theological Seminary, suggests, "No preacher can go on facing this age with a small message. Neither can they declare a big message which they have no right to speak." The crisis in preaching is nothing less than that of the preacher's identity. Who you are as a person precedes who you are and what you do in preaching itself. Sadly, this book is out-of-print.

Macleod, Donald, ed. *Here Is My Method: The Art of Sermon Construction*. Westwood, New Jersey: Revell, 1952. The method used by several prominent preachers from an earlier part of the last century.

- *Macpherson, Ian. *The Burden of the Lord: The Nature of Preaching and the Man Who Preaches*. Nashville, Tennessee: Abingdon, 1955. The author, a Scotsman, defines the primary task of preaching as getting hearers "to open their beings to the living Jesus." Winning intellectual assent is never the goal. You must have the burden to show them Christ, and your burden, when you have preached rightly, becomes their blessing. An absolutely wonderful book. One of my five favorites!
- Magnuson, Norris, ed. *Proclaim the Good News: Essays in Honor of Gordon G. Johnson*. Arlington Heights, Illinois: Harvest Publications, 1986. Johnson, dean of Bethel Theological Seminary, St. Paul, for many years was honored with this collection of essays on preaching. Several are valuable.
- Mawhinney, Bruce. *Preaching With Freshness*. Eugene, Oregon: Harvest House, 1991. Practical, fresh insight that deals with issues such as facing failure, filling and maintaining spiritual reservoirs, defining the scope of ministry and advance planning for sermons.
- McDill, Wayne V. *The Moment of Truth: A Guide to Effective Sermon Delivery*. Nashville, Tennessee: Broadman & Holman, 1999. How do you reach your people with both love and authority? McDill, a professor of preaching, offers helpful advice.
- McKibbens, Thomas R., Jr. *The Forgotten Heritage: A Lineage of Great Baptist Preaching*. Macon, Georgia: Mercer University Press, 1986. A wonderful book which surveys the history of preaching among the Baptists. The author's biases show, but the book is still a helpful one.
- McKim, Donald K. *The Bible in Theology & Preaching: How Preachers Use Scripture*. Nashville, Tennessee: Abingdon, 1994. Surveys a wide scope of theological positions

- including Roman Catholic, liberal, fundamentalist, scholastic, neo-orthodox, existential and narrative.
- Meuser, Fred W. *Luther the Preacher*. Minneapolis: Augsburg, 1983. A handy little book that underscores just how important preaching was for the Reformer.
- Miller, Donald G. *The Way to Biblical Preaching*. Nashville, Tennessee: Abingdon, 1957. The Introduction, "Faith Comes By Hearing," is a classic. Argues that true preaching confronts hearers with the question: "Where were you when they crucified my Lord?" It leads them to answer, "I was there!"
- *Mounce, Robert H. *The Essential Nature of New Testament Preaching*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1960. This is a truly classical exegetical study. It concludes that true preaching is a medium through which God contemporizes his historic self-disclosure in Christ and offers man the opportunity to respond in faith.
- Olford, David L., compiler. *A Passion for Preaching: Essays in Honor of Stephen F. Olford*. Nashville, Tennessee: Thomas Nelson, 1989. Contributions by nineteen contemporary preachers including Criswell, Briscoe, Robinson, Stanley, Stedman, and Redpath. Contains some good essays.
- Perkins, William. *The Art of Prophesying*. Carlisle, Pennsylvania: Banner of Truth, 1996 (reprint of 1605). The work of the famous Puritan theologian William Perkins (1558-1602) who exercised a powerful preaching ministry in Cambridge. The text is helpfully revised by Sinclair B. Ferguson who also contributes a wonderful introduction to this reprint edition.
- *Piper, John. *The Supremacy of God in Preaching*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1990. Why should God be supreme in preaching and what does Jonathan

Edwards offer to the question? These questions form the layout of Piper's extremely useful material. Highly recommended.

Pitt-Watson, Ian. *Preaching: A Kind of Folly*. Philadelphia: Westminster, 1976. "Before a man can learn to preach he must first learn to believe in preaching," says the author. A helpful little book.

Reymond, Robert L. *Preach the Word!* Edinburgh, Scotland: Rutherford House, 1988. Connects theology to preaching in a useful way.

Robinson, Haddon W. *Biblical Preaching: The Development and Delivery of Expository Messages*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1980. Develops the "big idea" method that the author is so well known for in homiletics. Helpful and creative in a very positive way.

Robertson, A. T. *Types of Preachers in the New Testament*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1972. The author was a New Testament scholar in the first half of the twentieth century. This work analyzes sixteen selected preachers in the New Testament.

Robertson, A. T. *The Glory of the Ministry: Paul's Exultation in Preaching*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1979. A very helpful, older exposition of 2 Corinthians 2:12-6:10.

Shedd, William G. T. *Homiletics and Pastoral Theology*. London: Banner of Truth, 1965 (reprint of 1867). A standard older text that still offers some useful aid to the faithful preacher.

Skinner, Craig. *The Teaching Ministry of the Pulpit: Its History, Theology, Psychology and Practice for Today*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1973. Blends insights from several fields to give an overview of preaching.

*Spring, Gardiner. *The Power of the Pulpit*. Carlisle, Pennsylvania: Banner of Truth, 1986 (reprint of 1848).

Thoughts addressed to Christian ministers as well as to those who listen to preaching. Should be read by both. A classic!

Springer, Ernest. *Earnestness in Preaching: Admonition from the Fathers*. Audubon, New Jersey: Old Paths Publications, 1994. Shows how the older writers desired and sought to maintain "earnestness" in their preaching.

Stalker, James. *The Preacher and His Models*. New York: Doran Company, 1891. The Yale Lectures of 1891.

Stewart, James S. *A Faith to Proclaim*. London: Hodder & Stoughton, 1953. Another Yale Lectures Series, given by the late professor Stewart, who taught at the University of Edinburgh for many years. Valuable material.

*Stott, John R. W. *Between Two Worlds: The Art of Preaching in the Twentieth Century*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1982. My well-marked autographed copy has been read several times and is valued highly. Get it and read slowly.

Thielicke, Helmut. *Encounter with Spurgeon*. Philadelphia: Fortress, 1963. The work of Spurgeon's *Lectures to My Students* is included in an edited and abridged form with an Introduction by the great German preacher Thielicke.

Thomson, Ernest Trice. *Changing Emphases in American Preaching*. Philadelphia: Westminster, 1943. The famous Stone Lecture Series of 1943 by a former professor at Union Theological Seminary in Virginia. From Bushnell to Rauschenbusch, via D. L. Moody. A fascinating overview.

Turnbull, Ralph G. *The Preacher's Heritage, Task, and Resources*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1968. Turnbull was one of freshest minds in the field thirty years ago. I have always valued his books. Most are out-of-

print but worth finding.

- Turnbull, Ralph G. *A History of Preaching* (Volume Three). Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1974. A concluding volume to Dargan, above. Turnbull brought the series to the time of its publication in the 1970s.
- Wagner, Don M. *The Expository Method of G. Campbell Morgan*. Westwood, New Jersey, 1957. A helpful study of the method of the famous London preacher.
- Webber, F. R. *A History of Preaching in Britain and America* (Three volumes). Milwaukee: Northwestern Publishing House, 1952. An immensely profitable set that is hard to find but worth the effort. Treats revivals and revival preachers very well.
- White, Douglas. *The Excellence of Exposition*. Neptune, New Jersey: Loizeaux, 1977. Seeks to show the paramount importance of exposition.
- White, R. E. O. *A Guide to Preaching*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1973. A useful primer on the subject of homiletics.
- Wiersbe, Warren W. and Lloyd M. Perry. *The Wycliffe Handbook of Preaching and Preachers*. Chicago: Moody Press, 1984. A survey of preachers and preaching from five perspectives: chronological, rhetorical, biographical, homiletical and illustrative.
- Wiersbe, Warren W. *Preaching & Teaching with Imagination: The Quest for Biblical Ministry*. Wheaton, Illinois: Victor Books, 1994. Biblical preaching should not be dull, lifeless and unimaginative. Wiersbe has a gift in showing how you can be faithful to the text and also cultivate the imagination properly.
- Wilhite, Keith, and Scott M. Gibson, eds. *The Big Idea of Biblical Preaching*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Baker, 1998. Haddon Robinson has contended for years that a

sermon should be a bullet, not a buckshot. This volume is prepared by scholars influenced by and appreciative of Robinson's work. There are some excellent essays in this little volume.

- *Willimon, William H., and Richard Lischer, eds. *Concise Encyclopedia of Preaching*. Louisville, Kentucky: Westminster/John Knox, 1995. The most comprehensive reference work on Christian preaching in the English language, this volume combines concern for the practice of preaching with theological and historical themes. Wide in scope and diverse in style.
- *Willimon, William H. *Peculiar Speech: Preaching to the Baptized*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1992. A hard-hitting presentation of the gospel as over against pluralism and relativism. A sharp critique of some popular homiletical devices and conclusions. Recommended!
- Willimon, William H. *The Intrusive Word: Preaching to the Unbaptized*. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1994. Rebukes the faithless meddling in marketing and consumerism that plagues the modern church. A holy and prophetic call to wake up!
- Wilson, Paul Scott. *A Concise History of Preaching*. Nashville, Tennessee: Abingdon, 1992. A fine shorter treatment that will serve well those who do not need the bigger sets listed above.
- Witherspoon, Jesse Burton. *Sent Forth to Preach: Studies in Apostolic Preaching*. New York: Harper, 1954. Witherspoon taught preaching for several decades at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky. This is a fine New Testament study of the subject.
